Course Description: Course introduces fundamental components of precision agriculture. Topics include: the global positioning system (GPS), geographic information systems (GIS), remote sensing, yield monitoring, variable rate application (VRA), and analysis and decision making for agriculture.

Course Objectives:

- Explain basic concepts of precision farming
- Define basic principles of GPS, GIS, VRA, and remote sensing
- Analyze and evaluate of precision farming data
- Identify advantages of precision agriculture compared to the cost and time invested
