Course Objectives: The **purpose of this course** is to introduce the student to various aspects of tree care with the detailed study of woody plants emphasizing growth and development, plant health care, pruning, maintenance, diagnostics, pest management, soil & water management and site evaluation.

*Upon completion of this course students will

Learn how a tree grows and survives as a woody perennial plant. Be able to list a variety of tree ailments and their causes. Be able to use a systematic process to diagnose tree ailments. Gain experience in tree care techniques.

Lab Exercises: In lab students will get hands-on experience with pruning, planting and mulching as well as looking at trees in different growing conditions, and evaluating tree conditions and needs. Diagnosis of tree problems will also be evaluated when opportunities arise. Lab exercises will examine tree parts from the inside and out, Recommended supplies: 10X hand lens, Sharp knife or razor knife, colored pencils. A good pair of work boots will be needed for outdoor labs.

Plant Health Care Project: We will be tracking weather and other data as we go through the semester and keeping records in an Excel spreadsheet. We will be comparing data to past years and looking up information in reference books to understand when insects and diseases are likely to be active and vulnerable. We will also be looking at when plants will be in bloom (or other stages of growth) and how those stages coincide with treating to control pests. We will also be looking up appropriate treatment options.

Tree Pest/Disease/Problem Presentation(s): Students will be required to make presentations to the class on major and minor insect/disease/abiotic tree problems.

Student Journals: Students will submit weekly journal entries (via Google Form) reflecting on topics covered (10 pts each)
