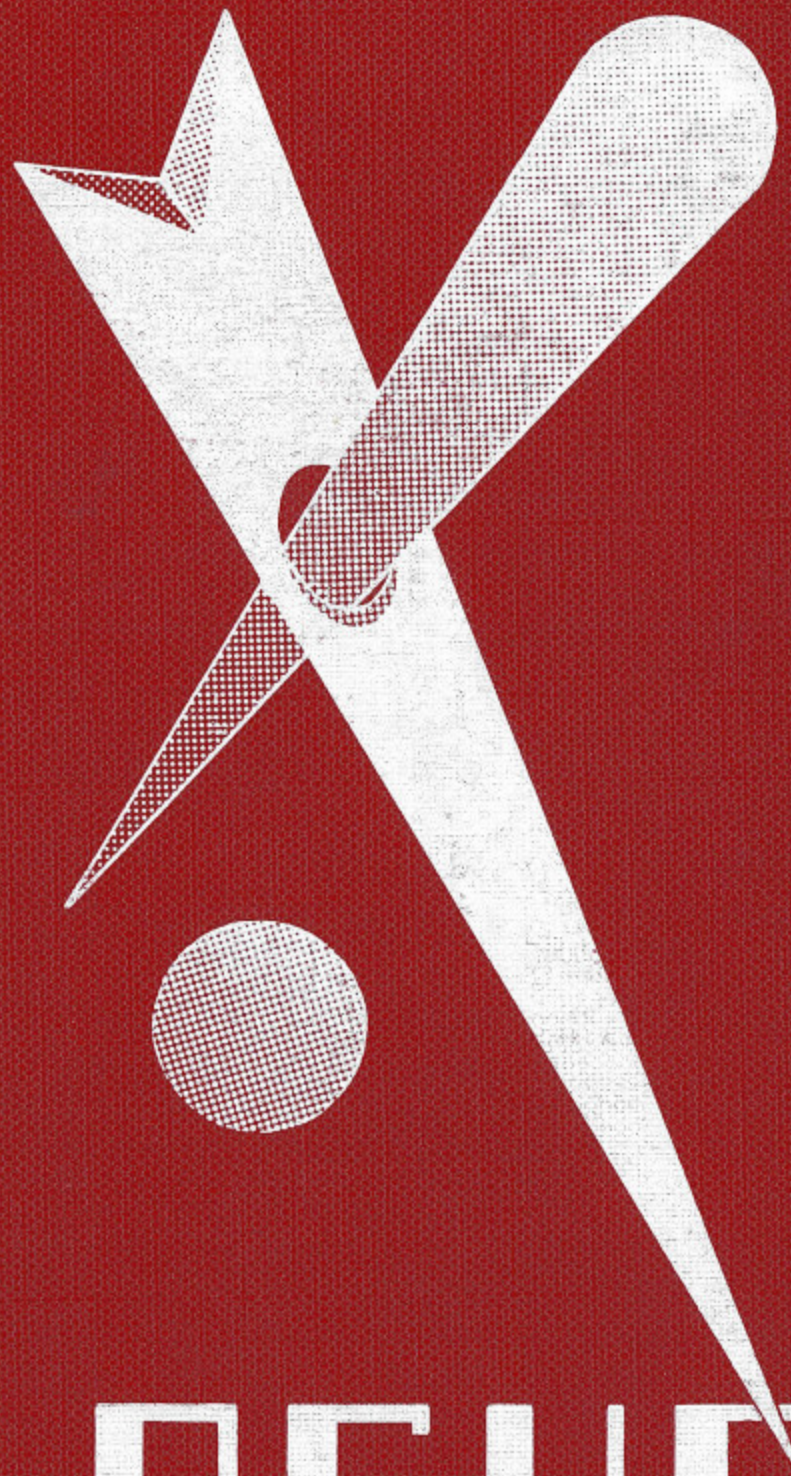

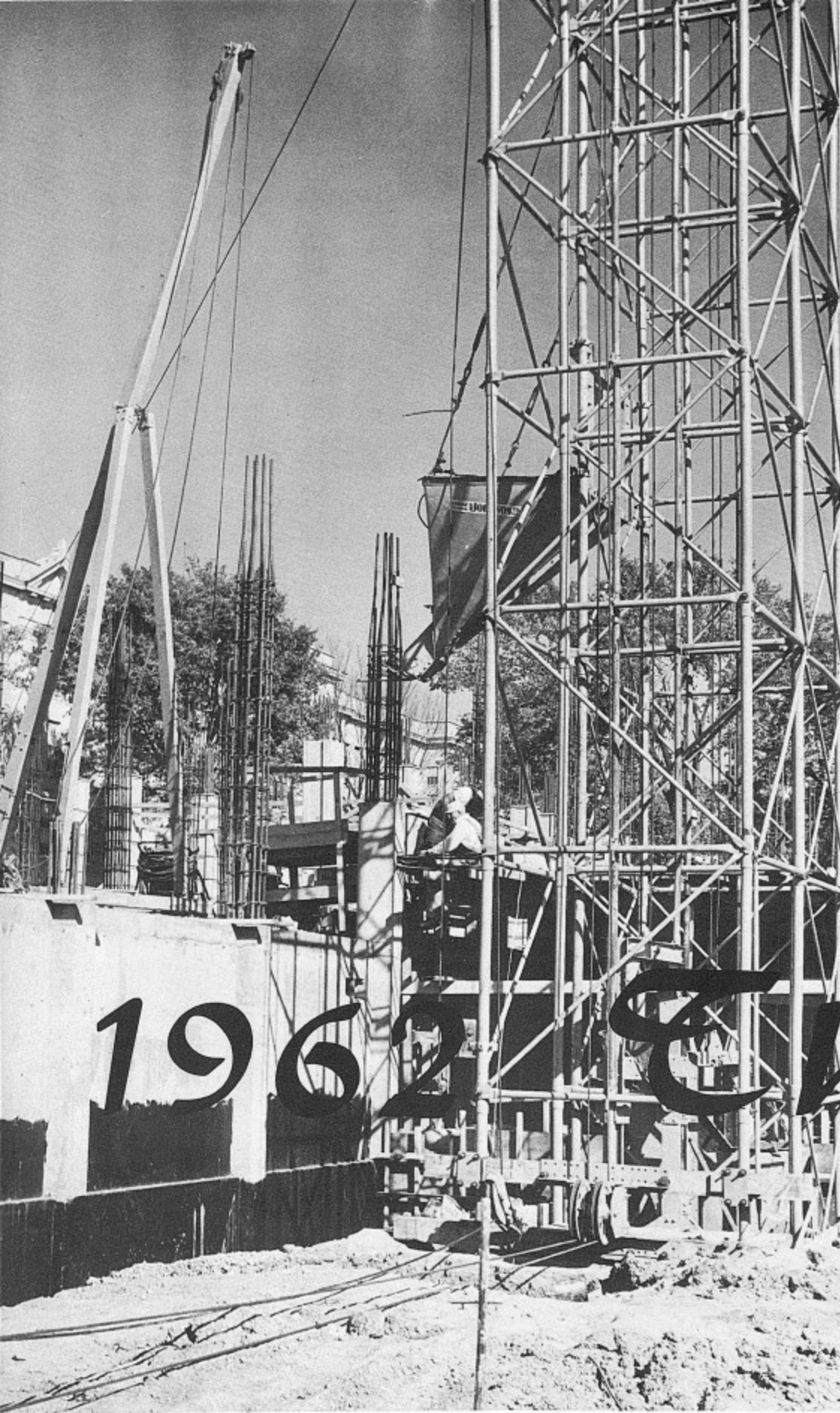


*As a laboratory for university students of education, the school does: exemplify the best practice for public education; provide observation and practice in which student teachers may acquire directed experiences in the art and science of teaching; provide opportunities for observing experimentation and evaluation in educational procedures; provide opportunities for the study to understand the school in its community relationships and to participate in community activities; provide opportunities for the investigation of educational problems; insure wholesome laboratory experiences for the university students by functioning as an effective school for children.*

*As an educational environment for children, the school does develop an understanding of the rights and obligations of citizens in a democratic society, including acceptance of individual and group responsibilities; obligation to think clearly and to attack problems intelligently; knowledge and application of social courtesies growing from increased awareness of others and consideration for others; interest in and participation in government; habitual and intelligent use of the mass modes of communication; concern for the conservation of natural and human resources; knowledge of how to buy intelligently and how to make wise use of goods and services; knowledge and habits of safety at home, at work, at school, in public places, in streets, and on highways; understanding of the significance of the family and respect for conditions conducive to successful family life; awareness of the social and economic implications of scientific developments; knowledge of vocations which will enable the student to explore his interests, aptitudes and abilities, and to plan for his place in the world of work.*

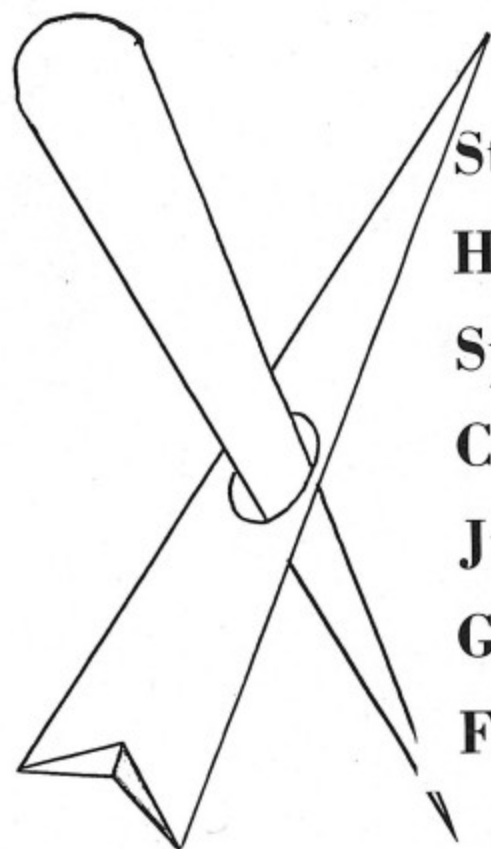
*The school does develop personal interests, sensitivity, and enjoyment, including: skills, interests, and abilities in social, cultural, and recreational activities; growth in desirable physical and mental health habits and attitudes; appreciation of literature, art, music, and nature; ability to use leisure time well and to budget it wisely.*

*It does provide for the continuous growth of the individual in the tools of learning, including: ability to express his thoughts clearly and correctly; ability to concentrate and to use wisely his time for study; ability to read; ability to use source materials and to evaluate information; ability to use number concepts accurately in solving problems; ability to use scientific method in the solutions.*

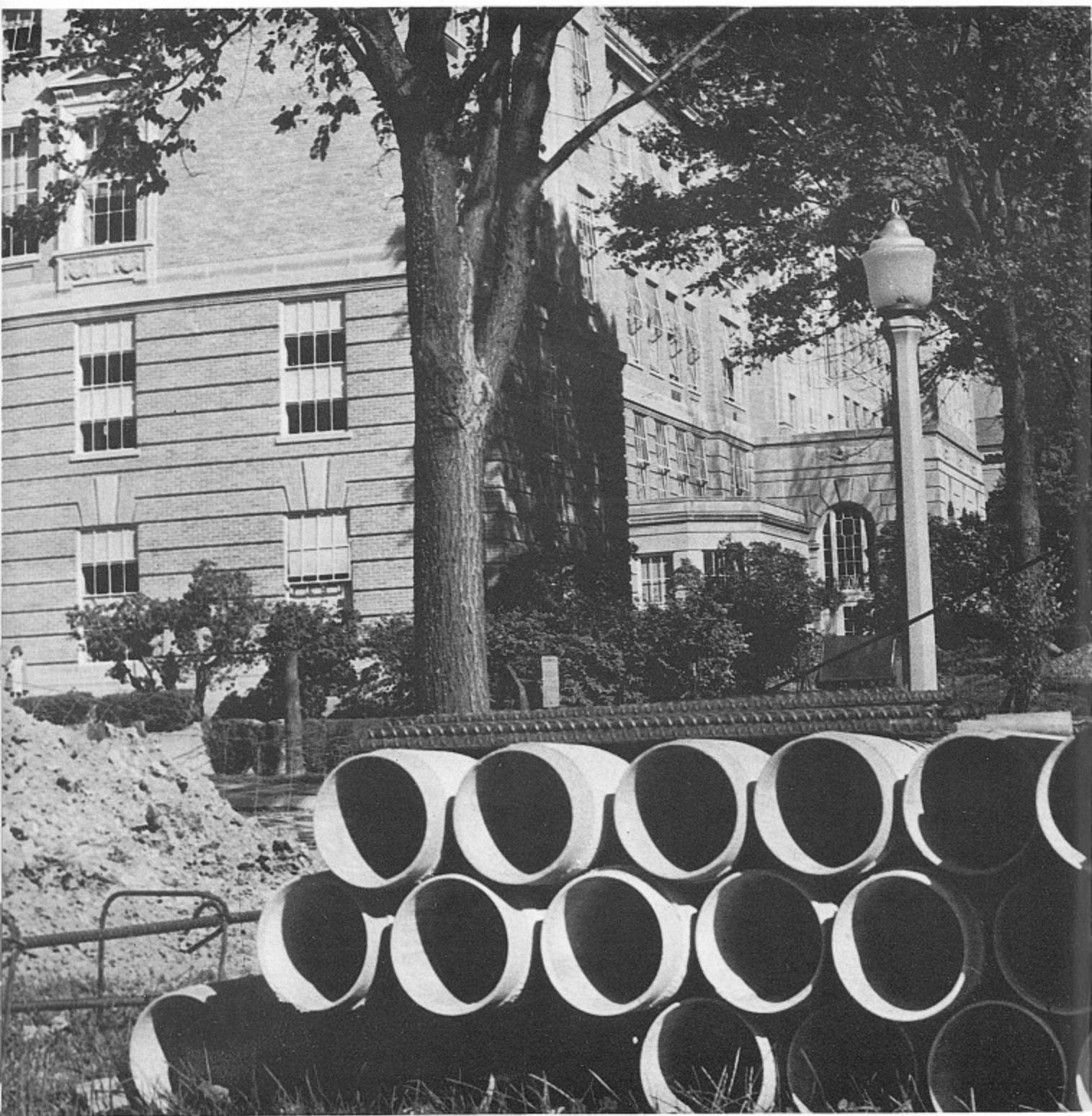

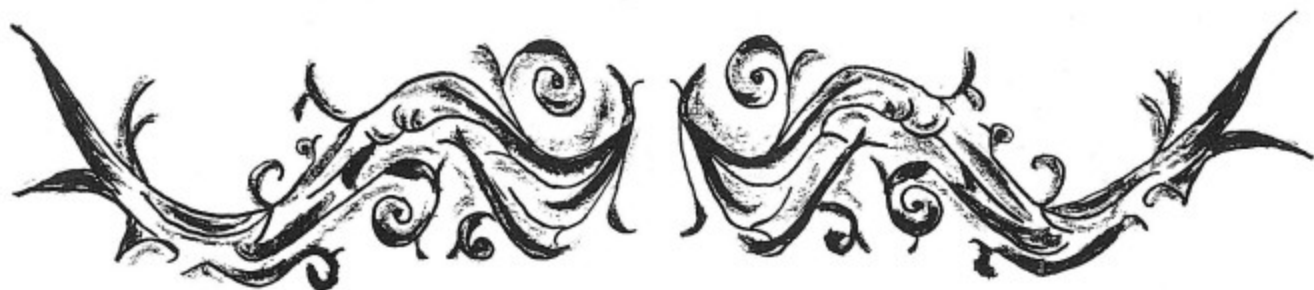

## DANCE IS HOMECOMING FINAL COUNT DOWN

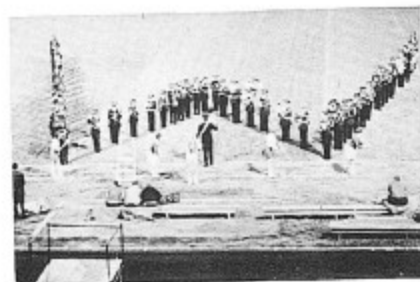

The annual Homecoming assembly was held on Friday morning. The main speaker was Dr. Curtis Howd, Principal of Burrus School, Ball State Teacher's College in Muncie, Indiana. The "Space Age" theme dominated Homecoming festivities. The Senior Class aimed for the moon and "landed" first prize in the parade Friday afternoon.

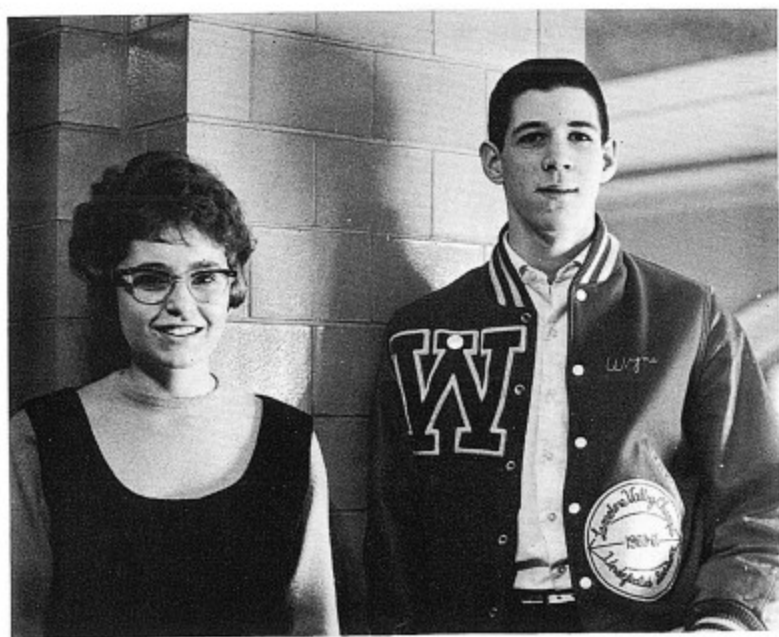
Friday night on the football field, the Western Cards met Hamilton. The band gave a special "space age" program at half-time.

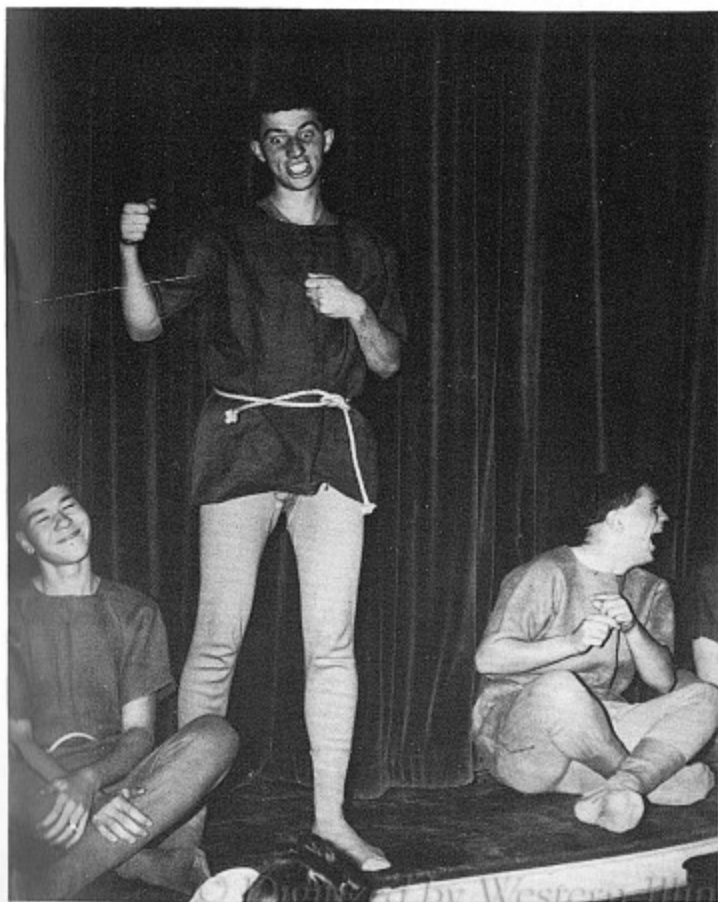

The Western High School Music staff consists of Mr. James Paulding, Strings and Choral music, Mr. Paul Potter, Band and Choral music, Dr. Oren Gould, Director of Music Education. The BOCH officers, elected by members of the music organizations, assisted the music instructors in planning the Class B State Contest and the annual banquet and dance.

The orchestra, directed by Mr. Paulding, participated in many activities this year. They performed in the Christmas and Spring Concerts and entered competition in Class B State Contest. Members of the organization played in ensembles for contest and other performances. Also, for the first time, a pit orchestra was organized. It provided music for *"A Midsummer Night's Dream"* and *"Mikado."*

The band, composed of high school and junior high members, was directed by Mr. Potter. He was assisted by capable student teachers. The band consisted of three separate divisions. May 29, 1962	The class of 1962 graduated.

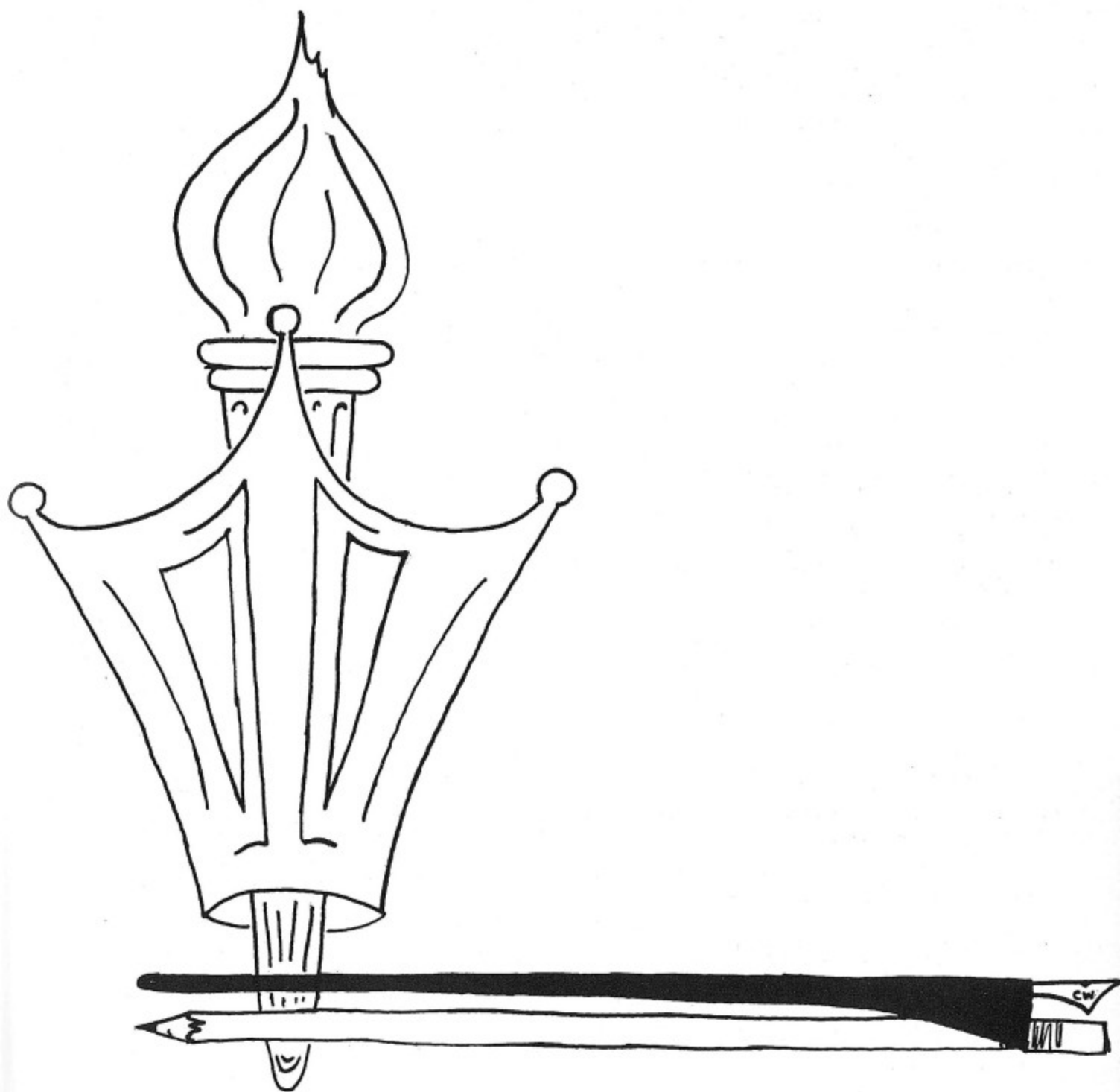

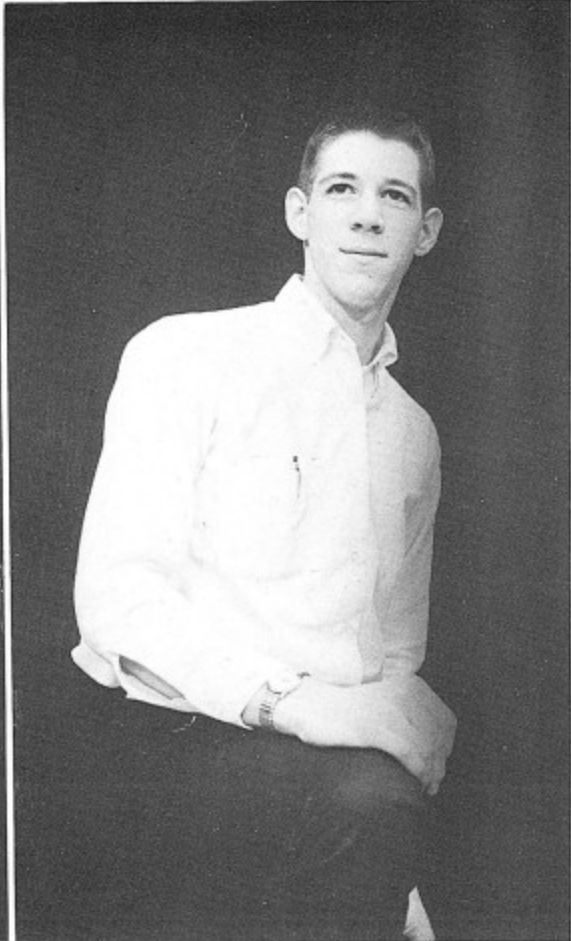

The initiation ceremony was performed by members of the National Honor Society of Galesburg High School.

The Sophia Chapter considers candidates for admission if they have a grade point average of 3.5 and if they meet the four qualifying traits: character, leadership, scholarship, and service. The Society looks upon education as a total product of life measured by these four dimensions.

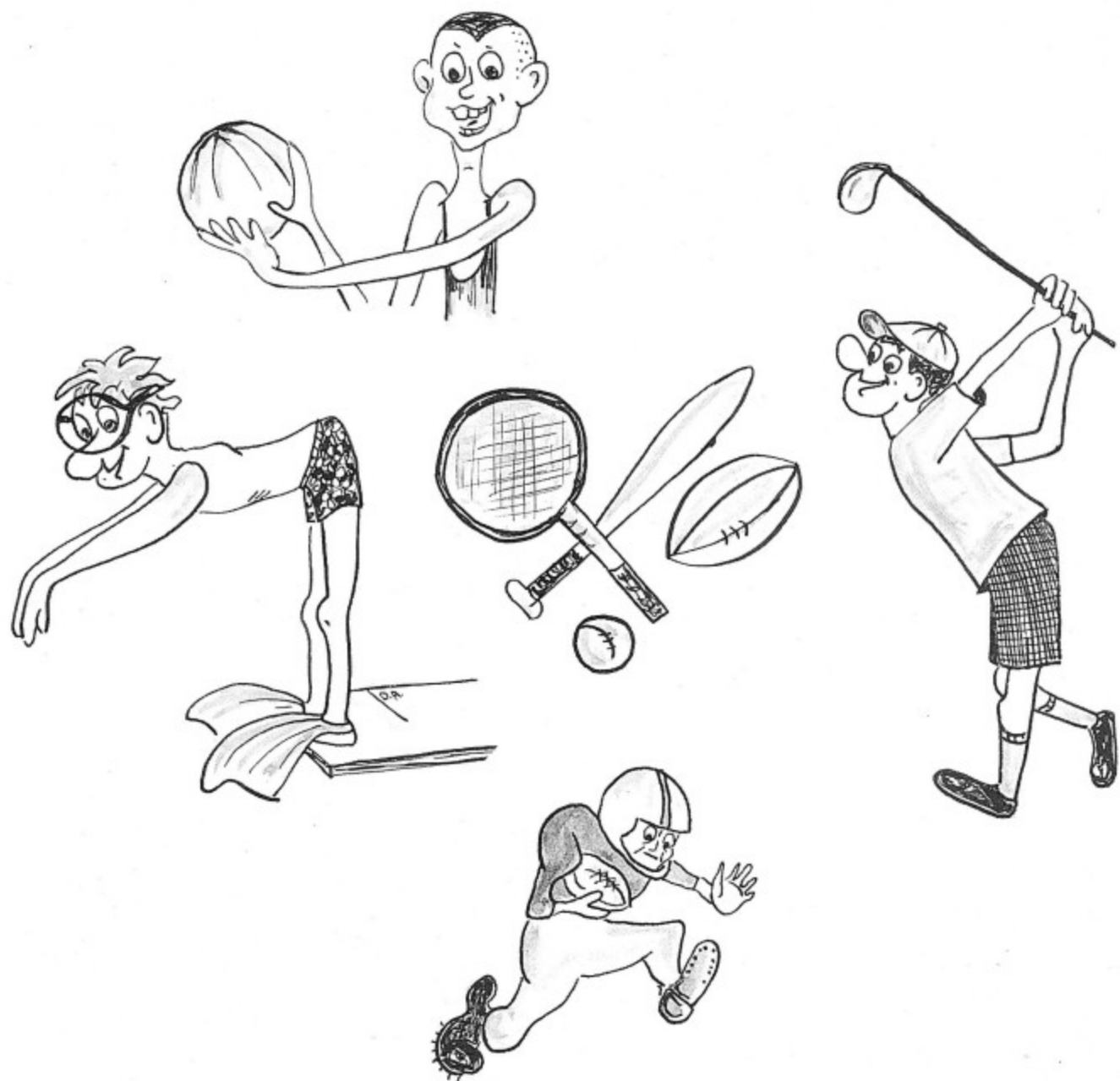
No honor conferred by any school excels that represented by the National Honor Society. It represents the fundamental objectives of a school and gives recognition to those who have attained the desired goals. The National Honor Society was organized in 1921. Until then there were only honor rolls, special privileges, school awards, and valedictory and salutatory addresses at graduation. There was no recognized national academic standard for secondary schools. The organization was developed to improve scholarship and to place academic work in its proper place in the estimation of society.

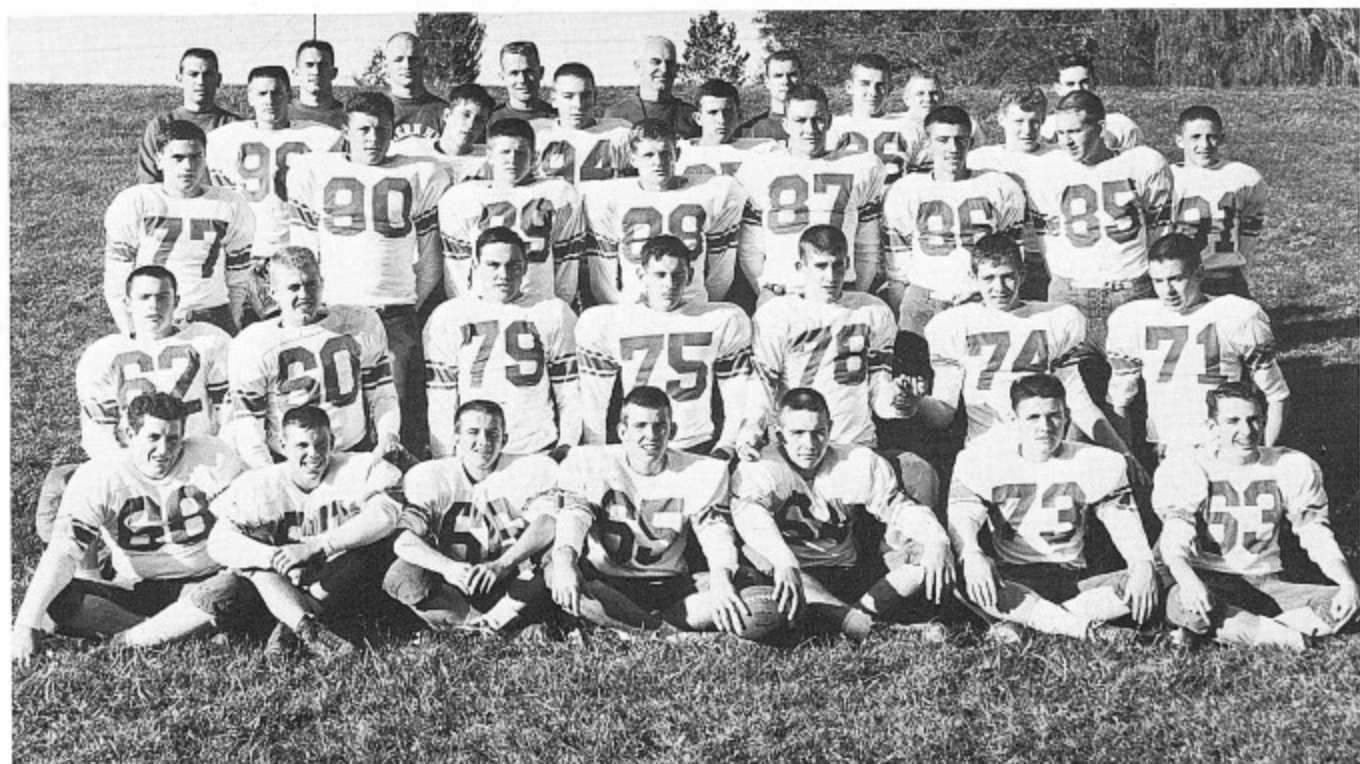

Western High's success in football comes from a combination of factors. There is a lot more to football than showing up on the field on a Friday night. Football at Western is much more than this.

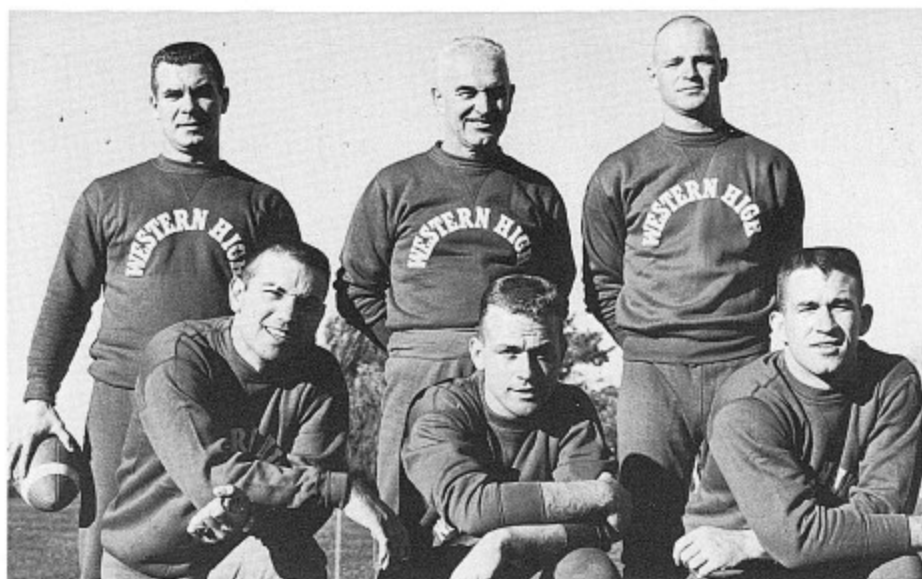

## HOHMAN'S CARDS COMPILE 24-4 RECORD

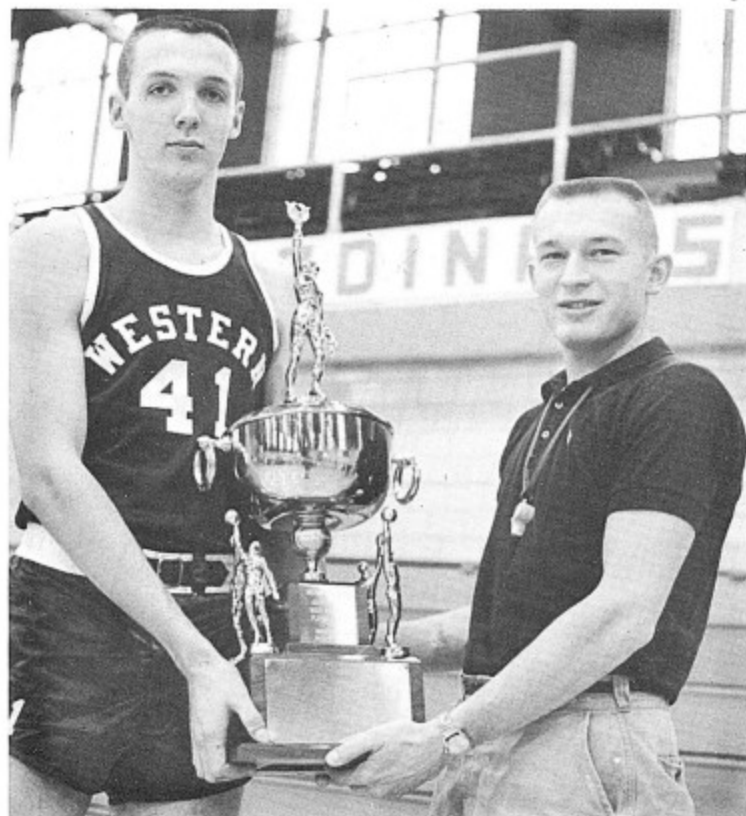

This ended a busy year for the class of '62. However, it also was the beginning of a new and exciting adventure as "the senior" took his individual path into the future.



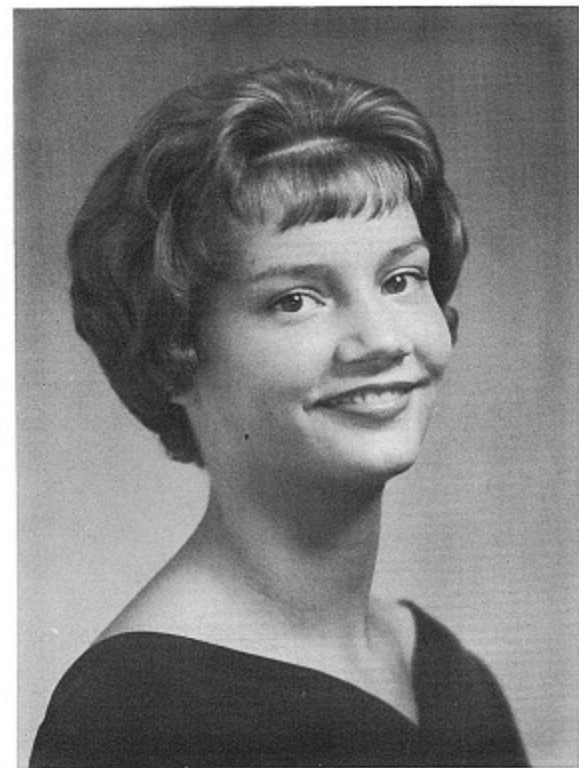

During the year, dramatizations were performed in the reading class.

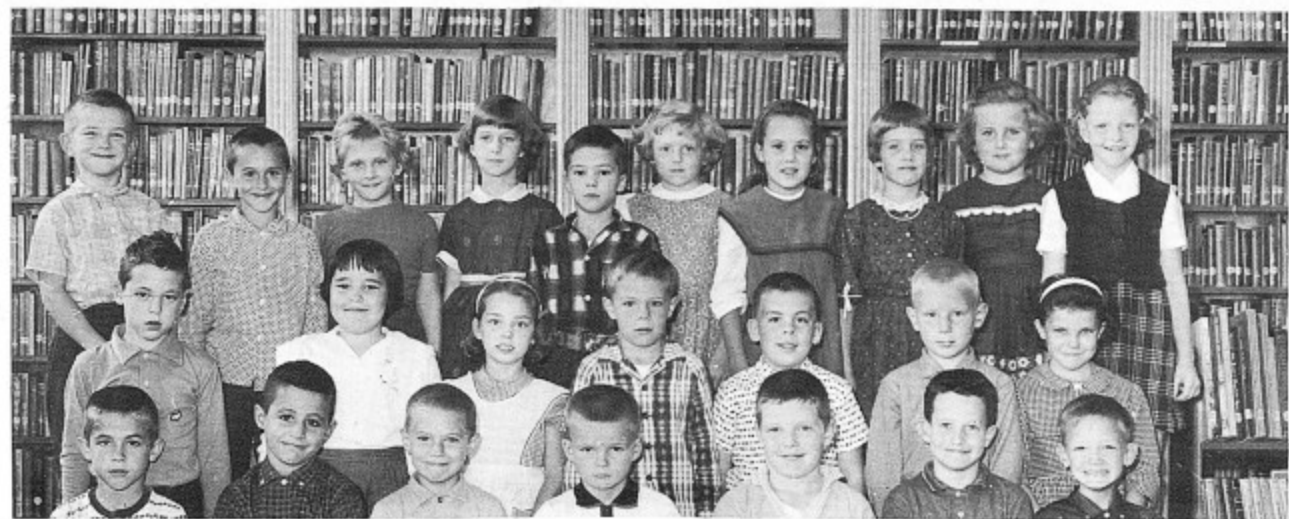
Bulletin boards and shelf displays were correlated with the subjects. The students arranged their own displays of grains, rocks, shells, and clothing materials.

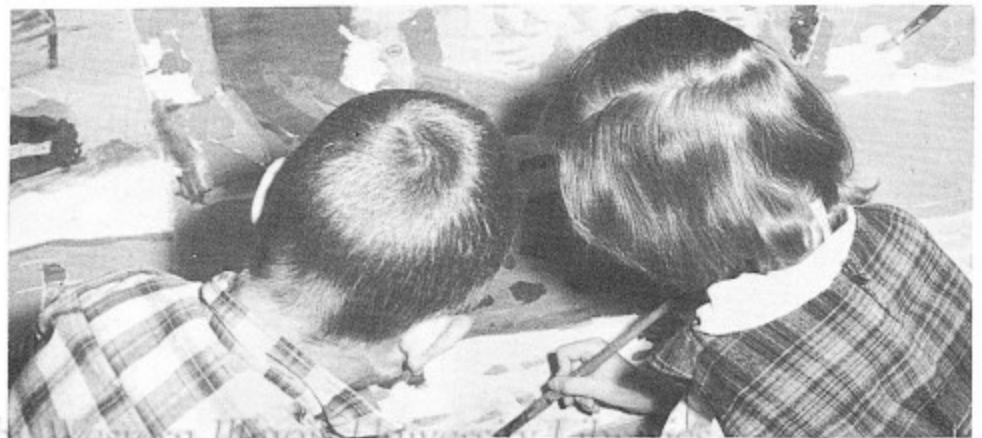
