strong but handsome.

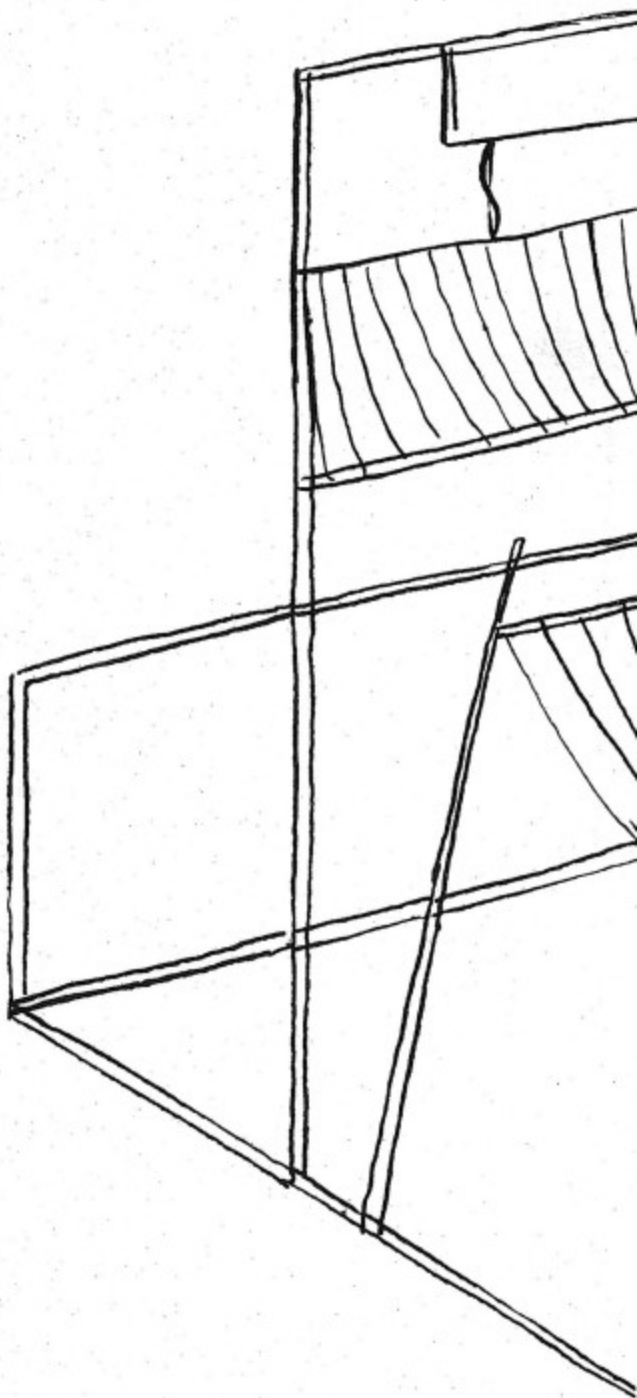
This is wool tweed,

versatile, busy.

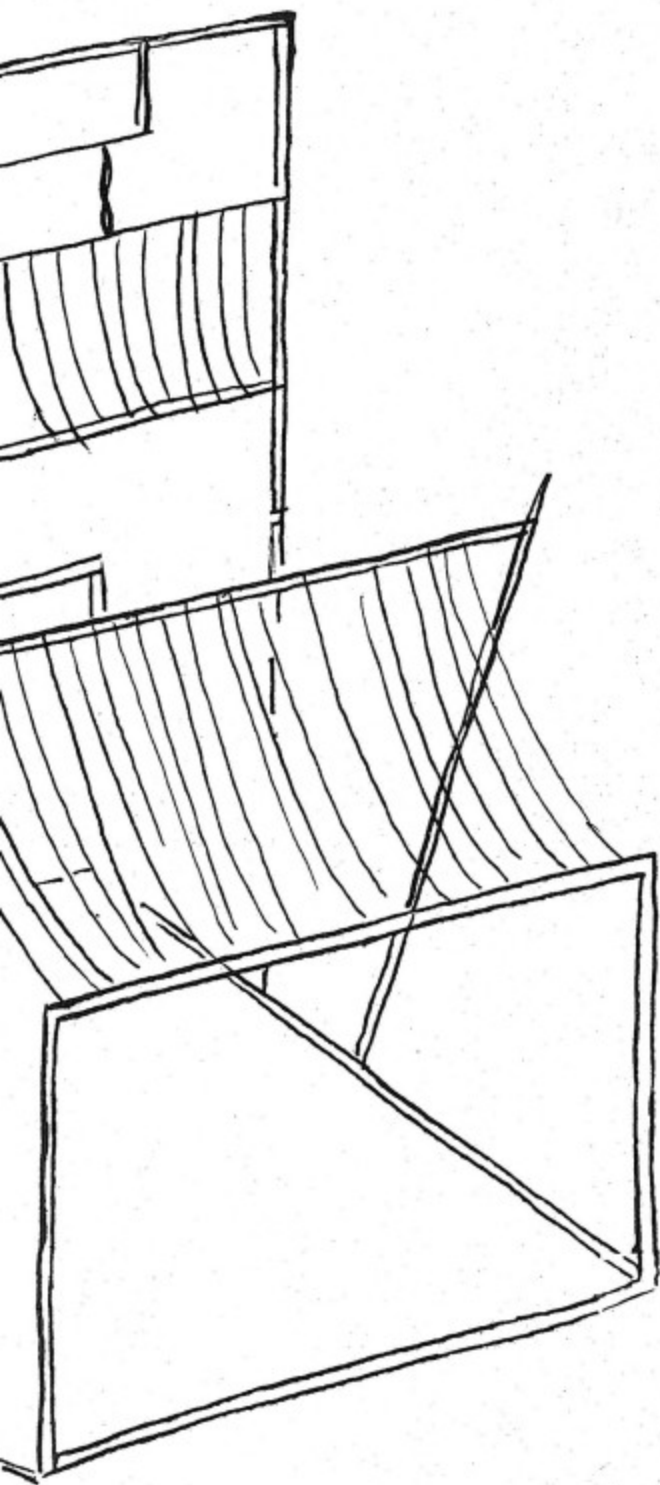
Feel the velvet,

to be lived as he wills it.

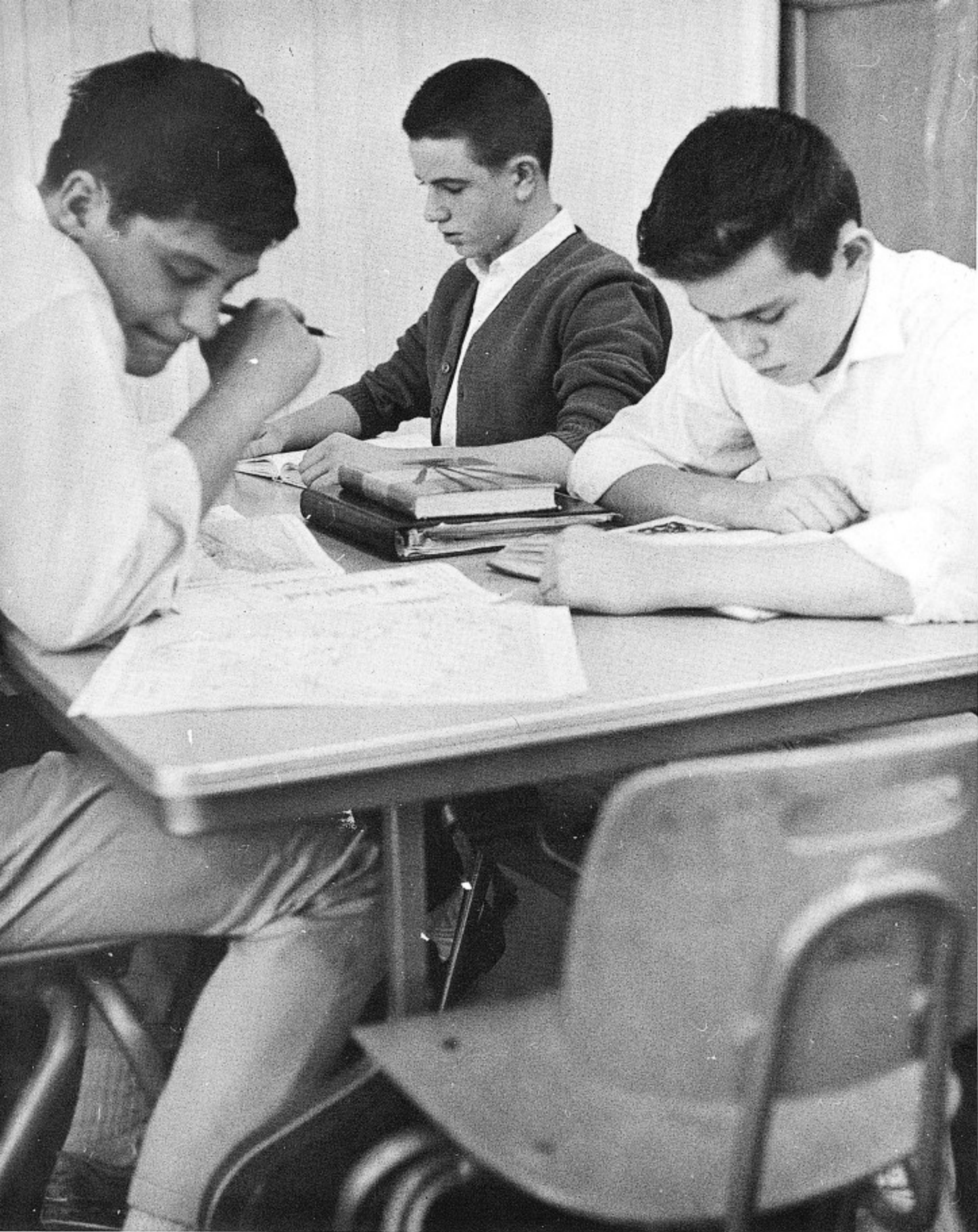
That is what some say.

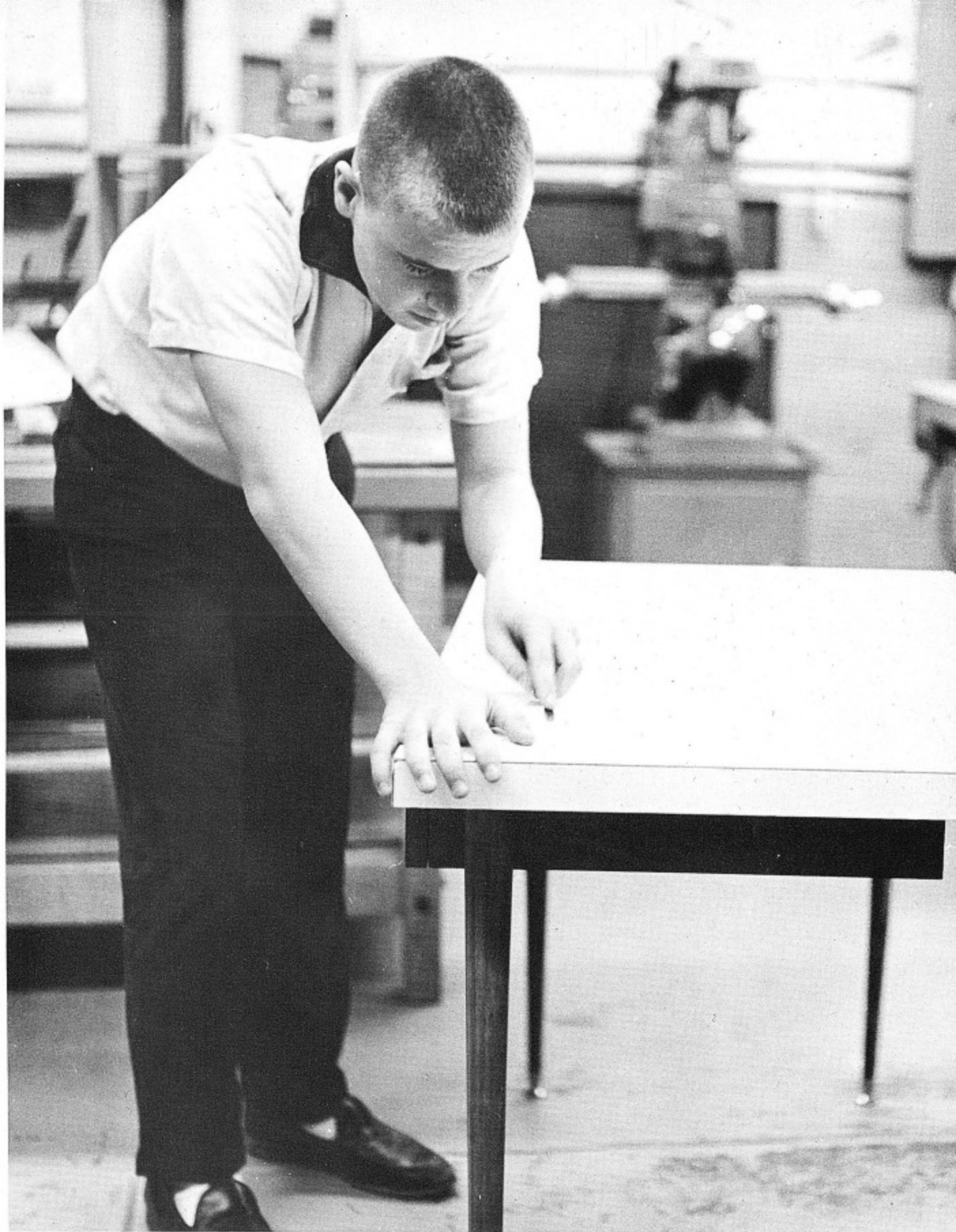

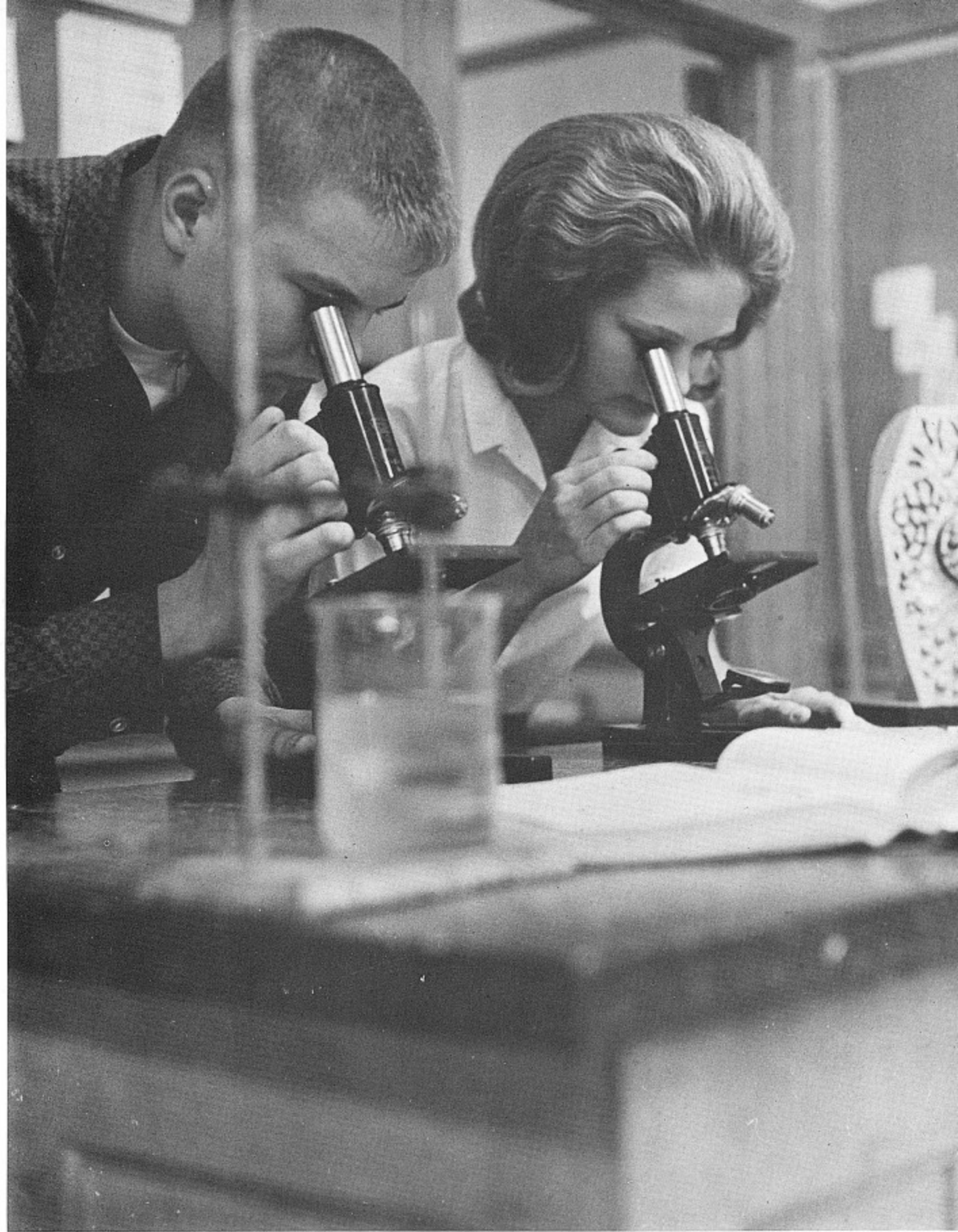

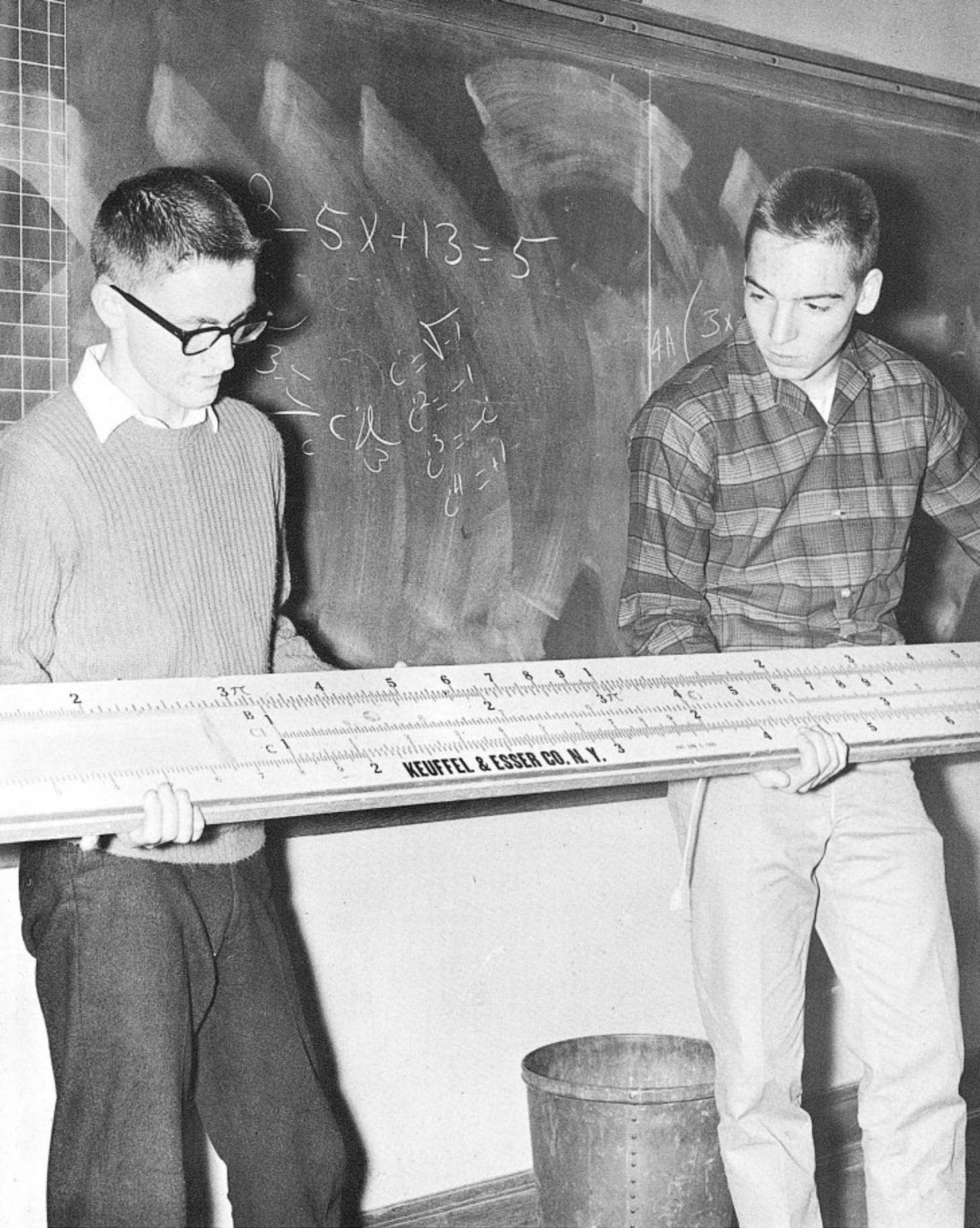

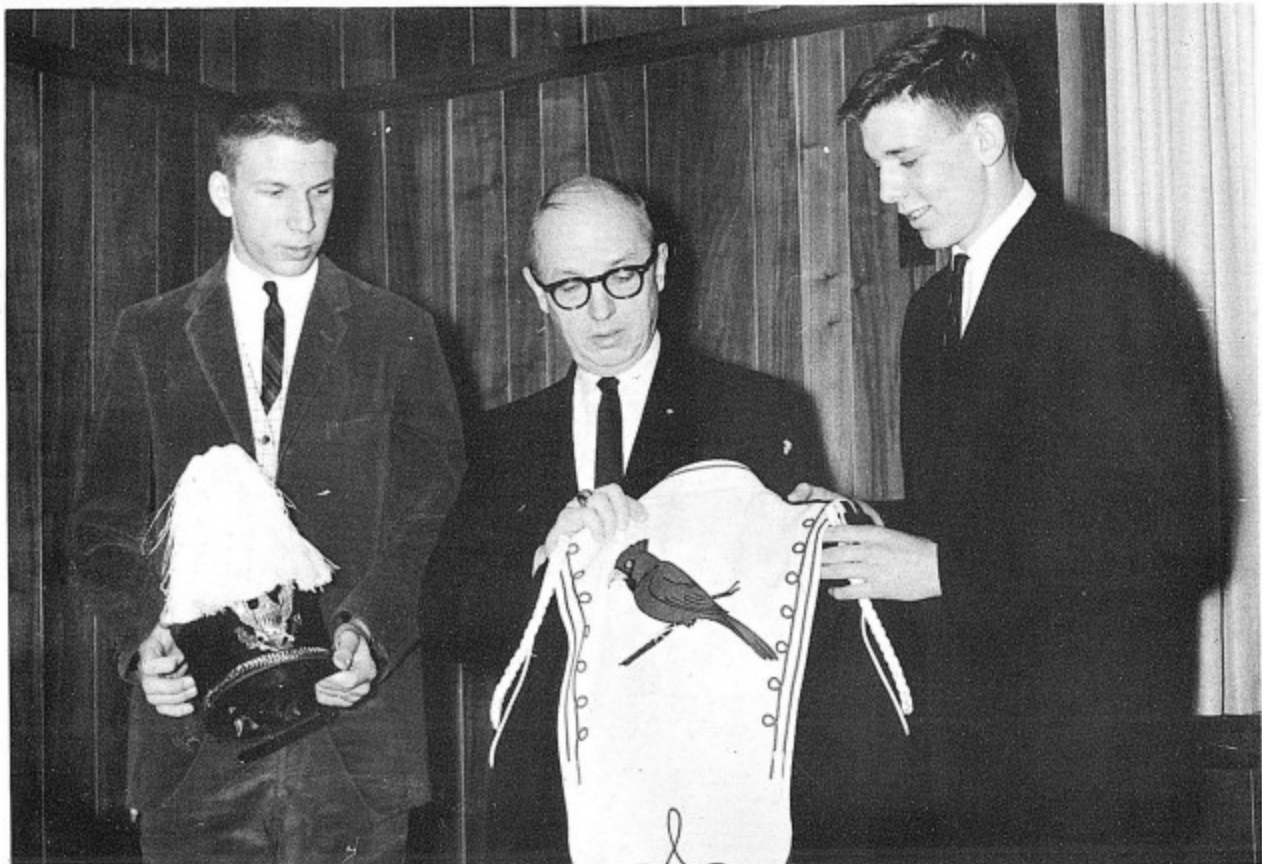
The Seniors and Juniors met first hour. Among the books selected were *Catcher in the Rye*, *A Farewell to Arms*, and *The Crucible*.

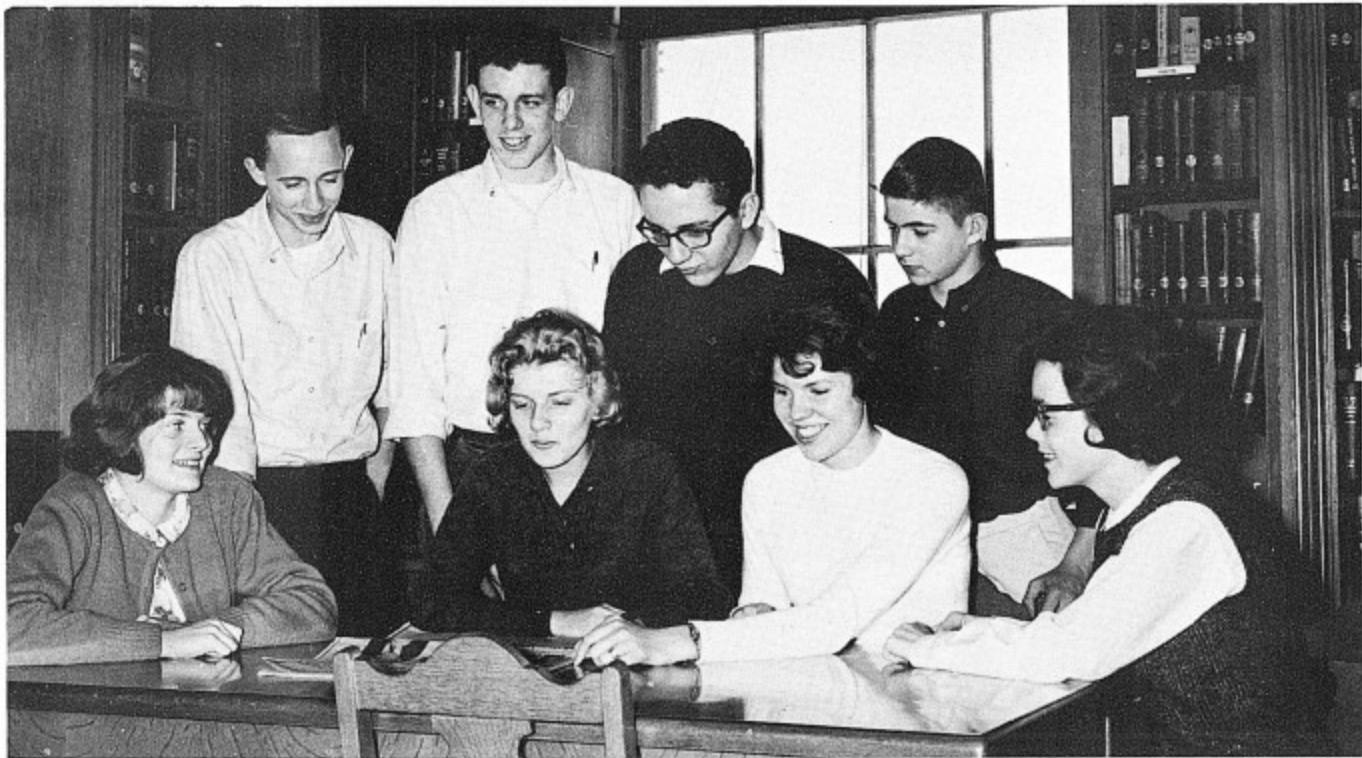
# BIOLOGY CLUB

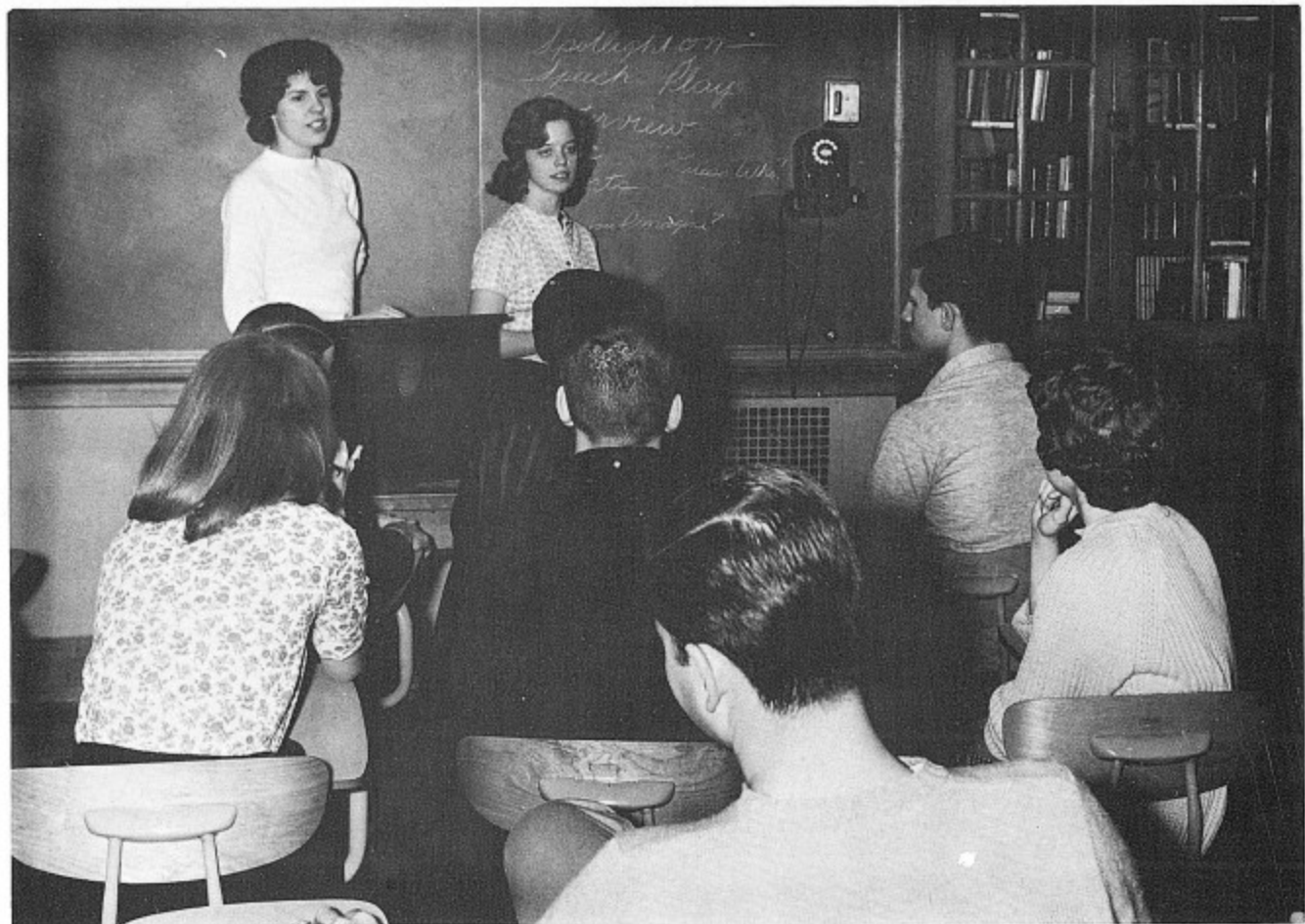

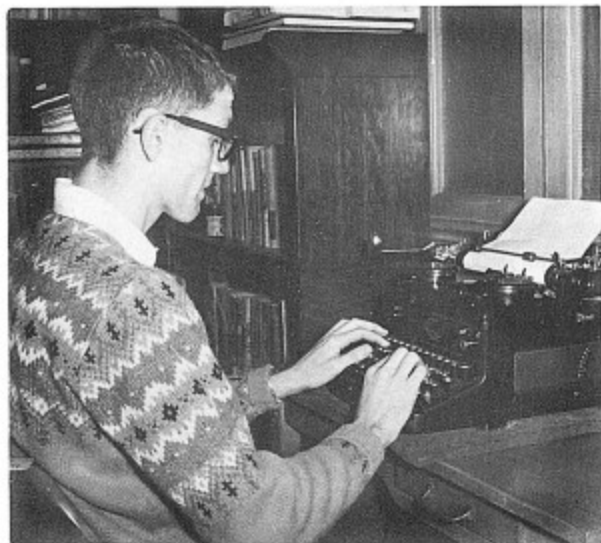
Editor Shirley Ferguson reviews the final plans for the next edition of the *Spotlight*.

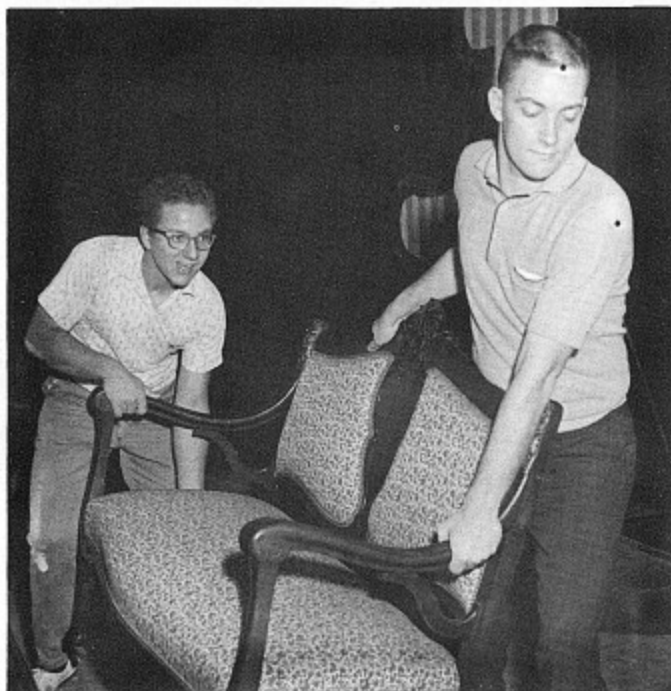

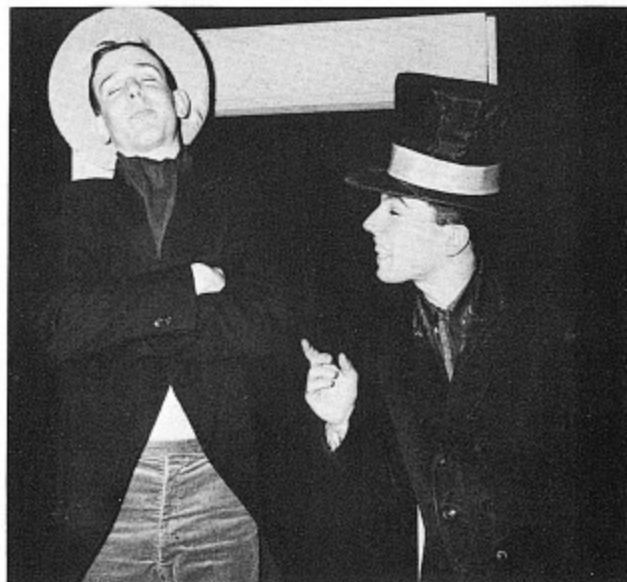

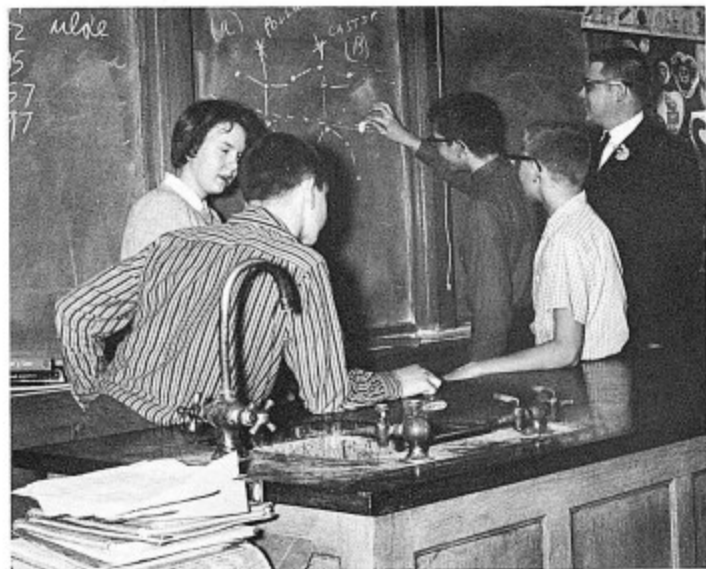

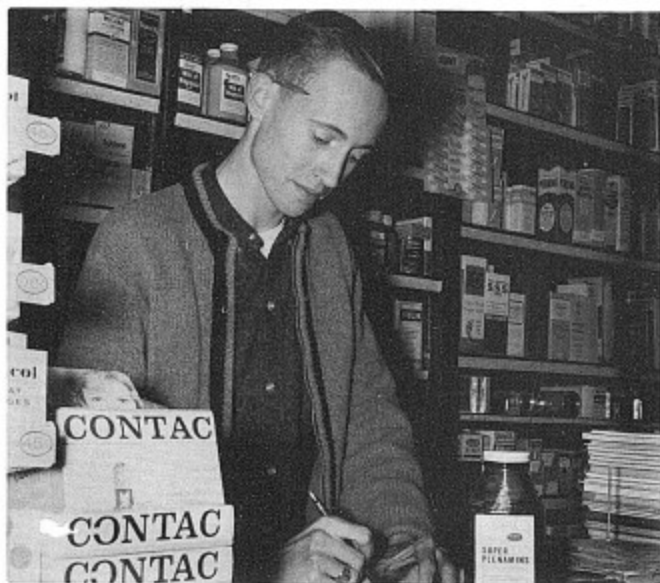

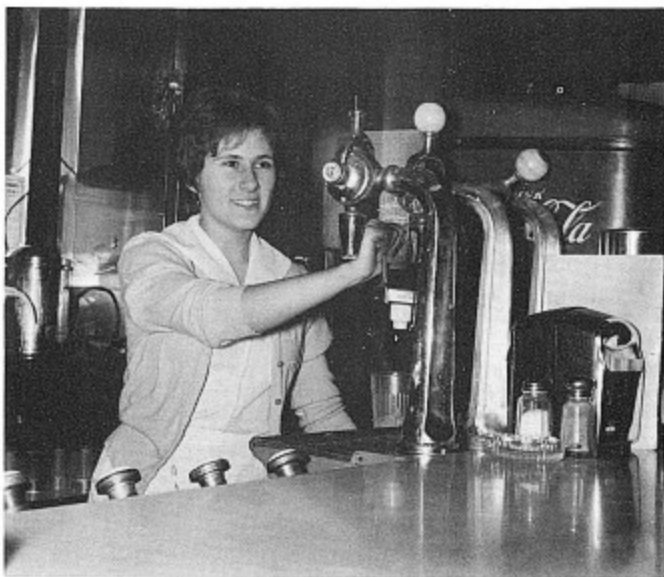

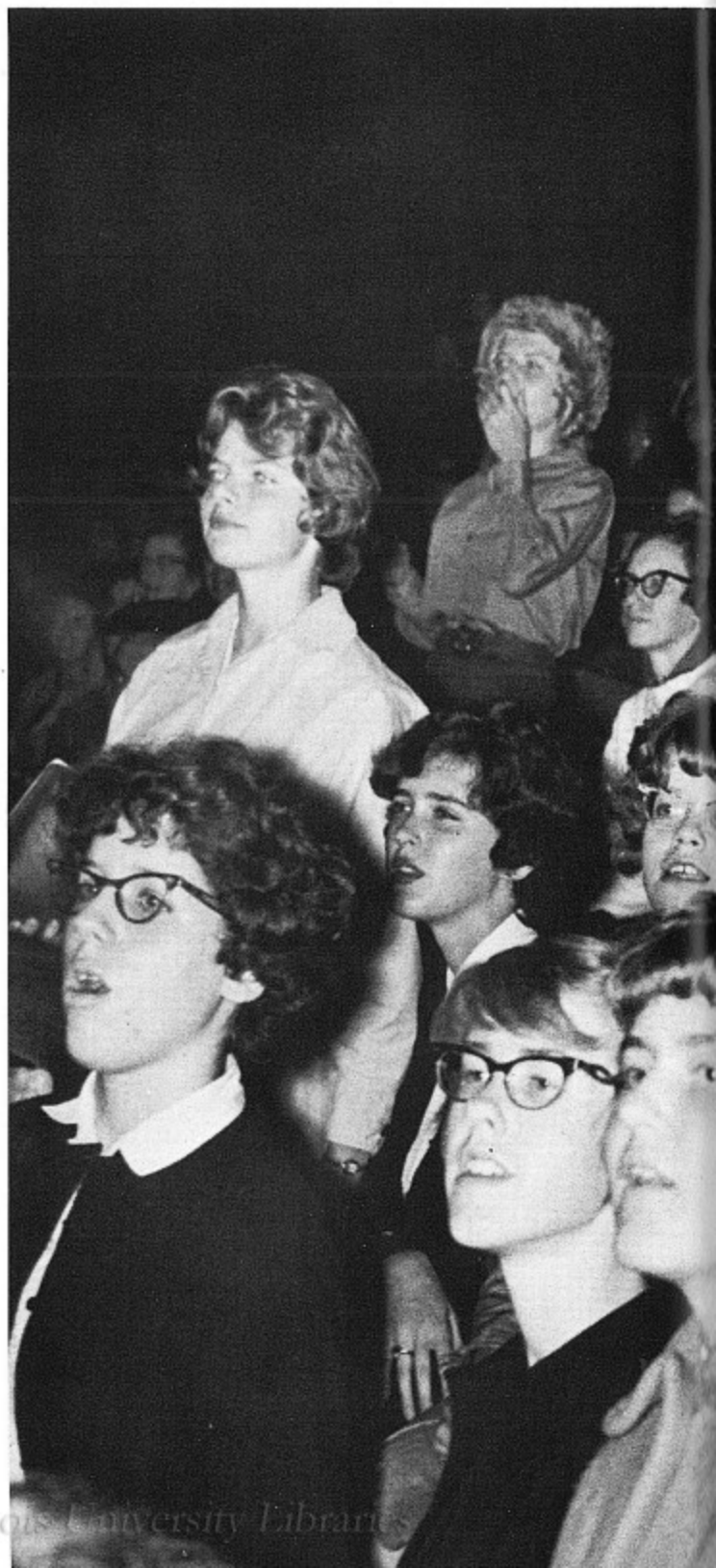
## Cardinals, They're Great . . . . .

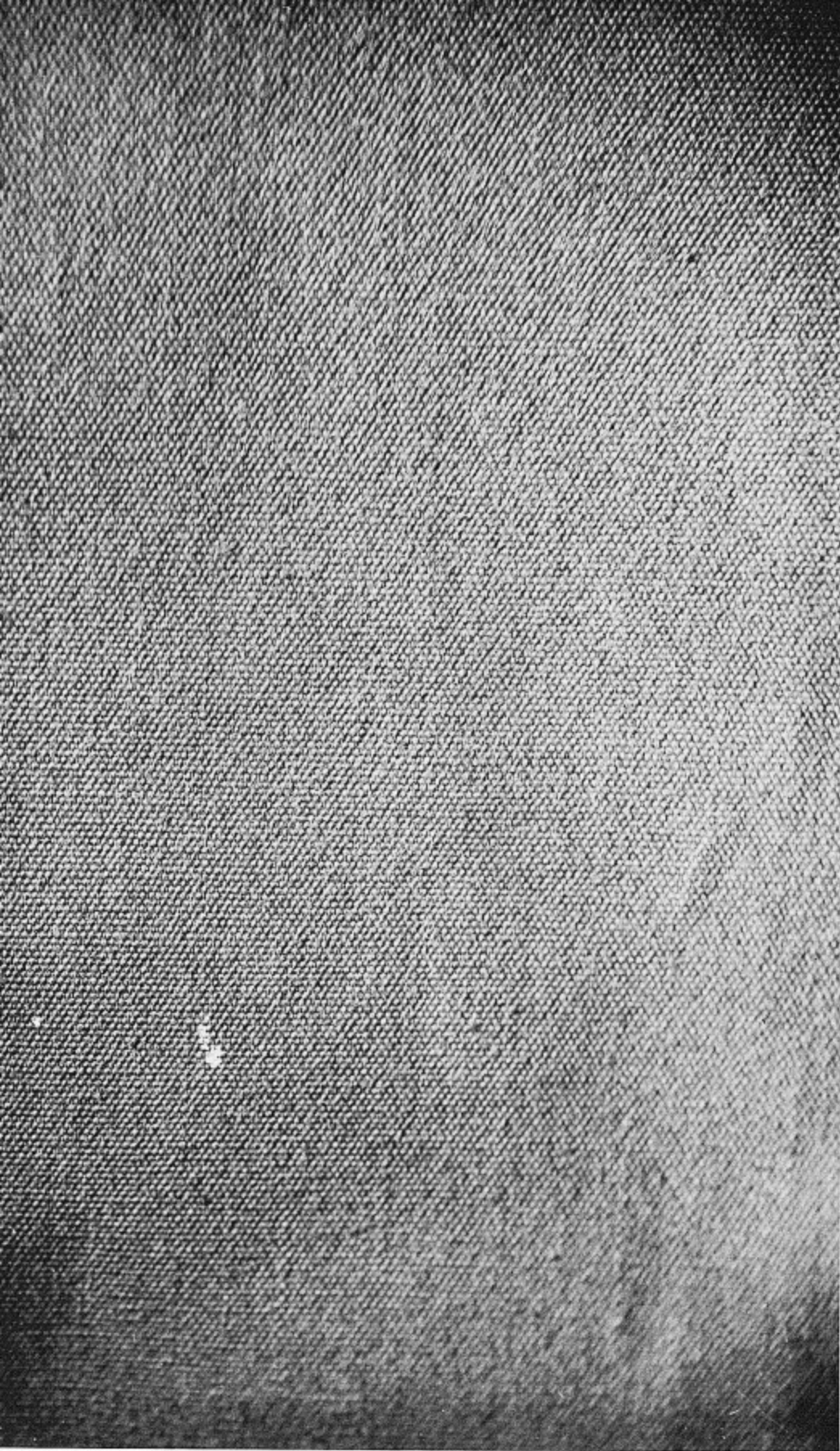


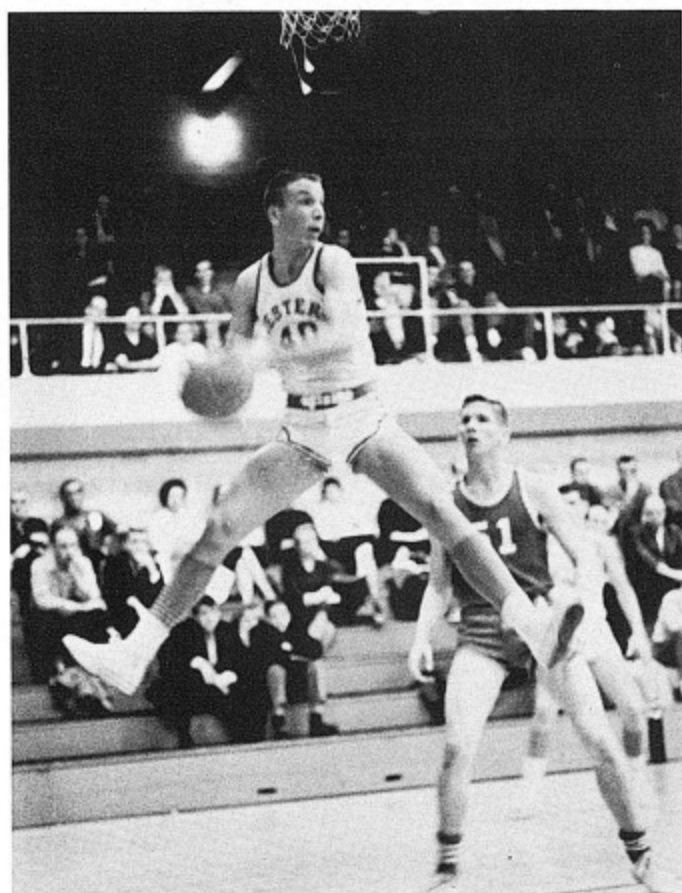
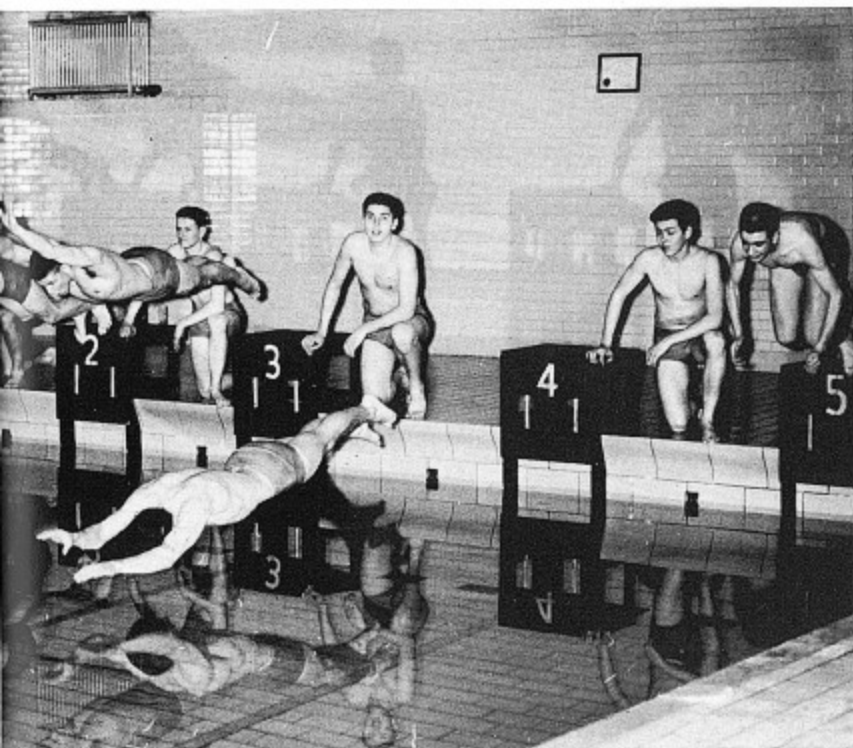


## JACKIE GLEASON CAME TO WESTERN

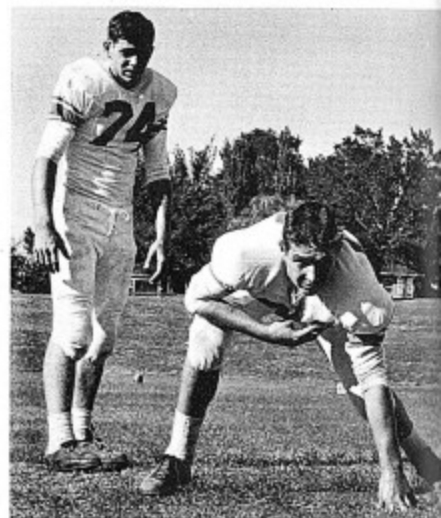
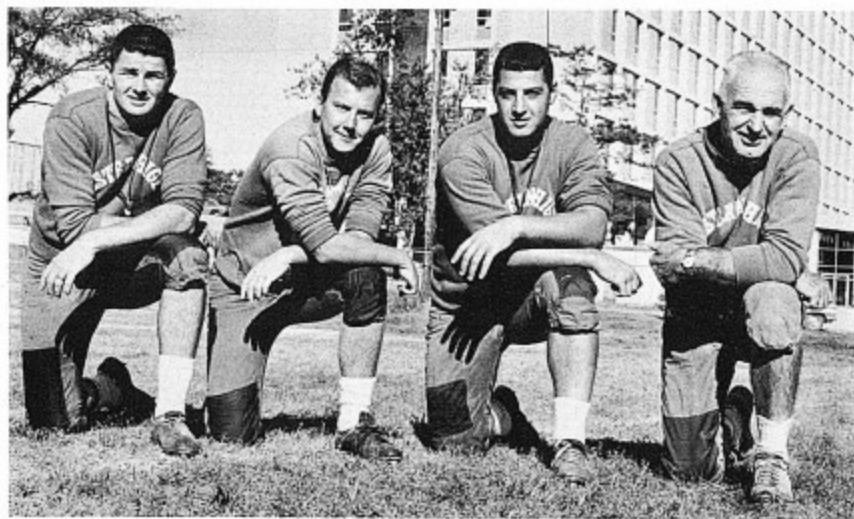

Seniors on the 1962 squad contributed a great deal to the successful season. Ends Dan Curtis and Chuck Wanninger played both offense and defense. Tony Cellucci also went both ways at tackle. Steve Nester, Kent Kowal, and Larry Elliott played mostly on defense. Roger Mason played both offense and defense at a halfback position. Jim Detrick, a center, was injured in the first game and was out for the rest of the season.

The Fresh-Soph squad, under the coaching of Rod Roundtree, also completed an undefeated season. In surging to a 6-0 record, the Junior Redbirds gave up only two touchdowns. This Fresh-Soph record indicates that these players will be able to carry out the tradition of winning Western High football in the future.

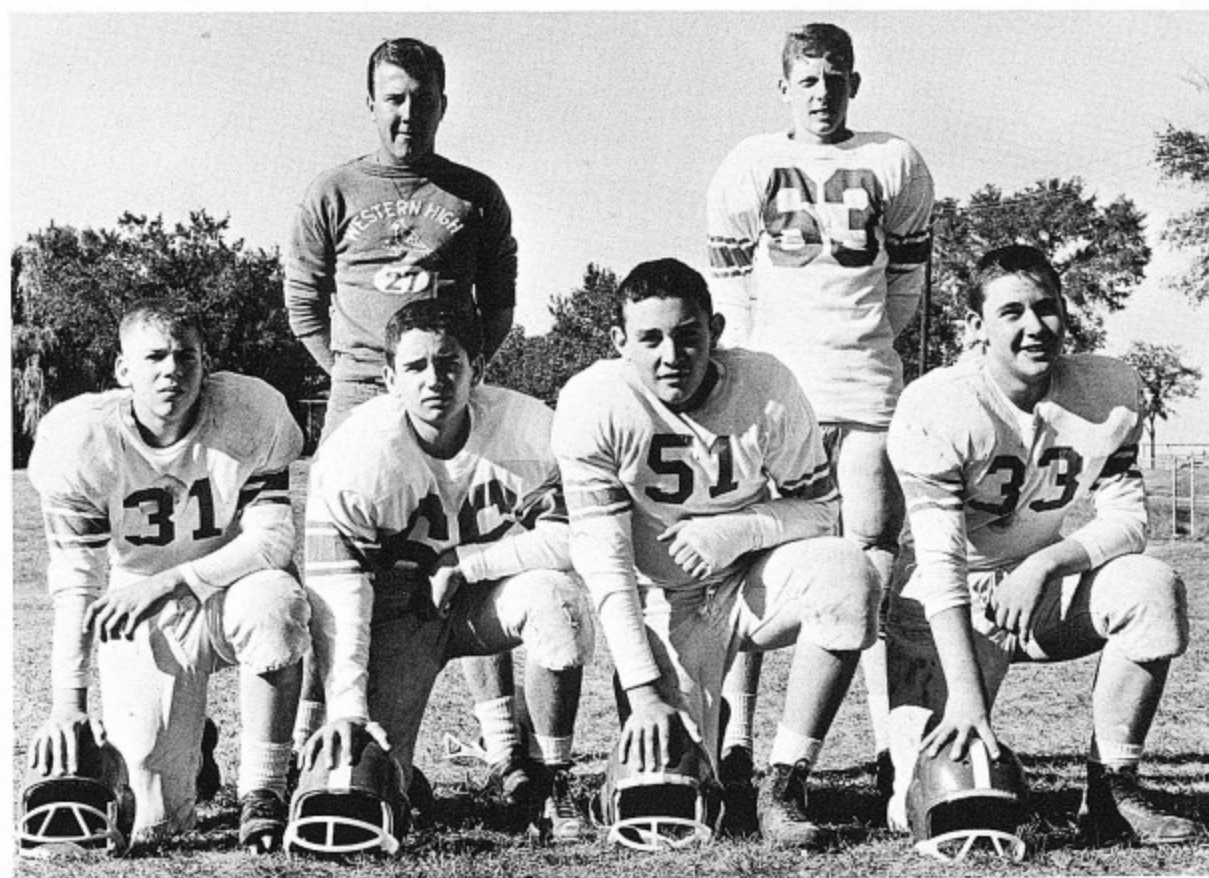

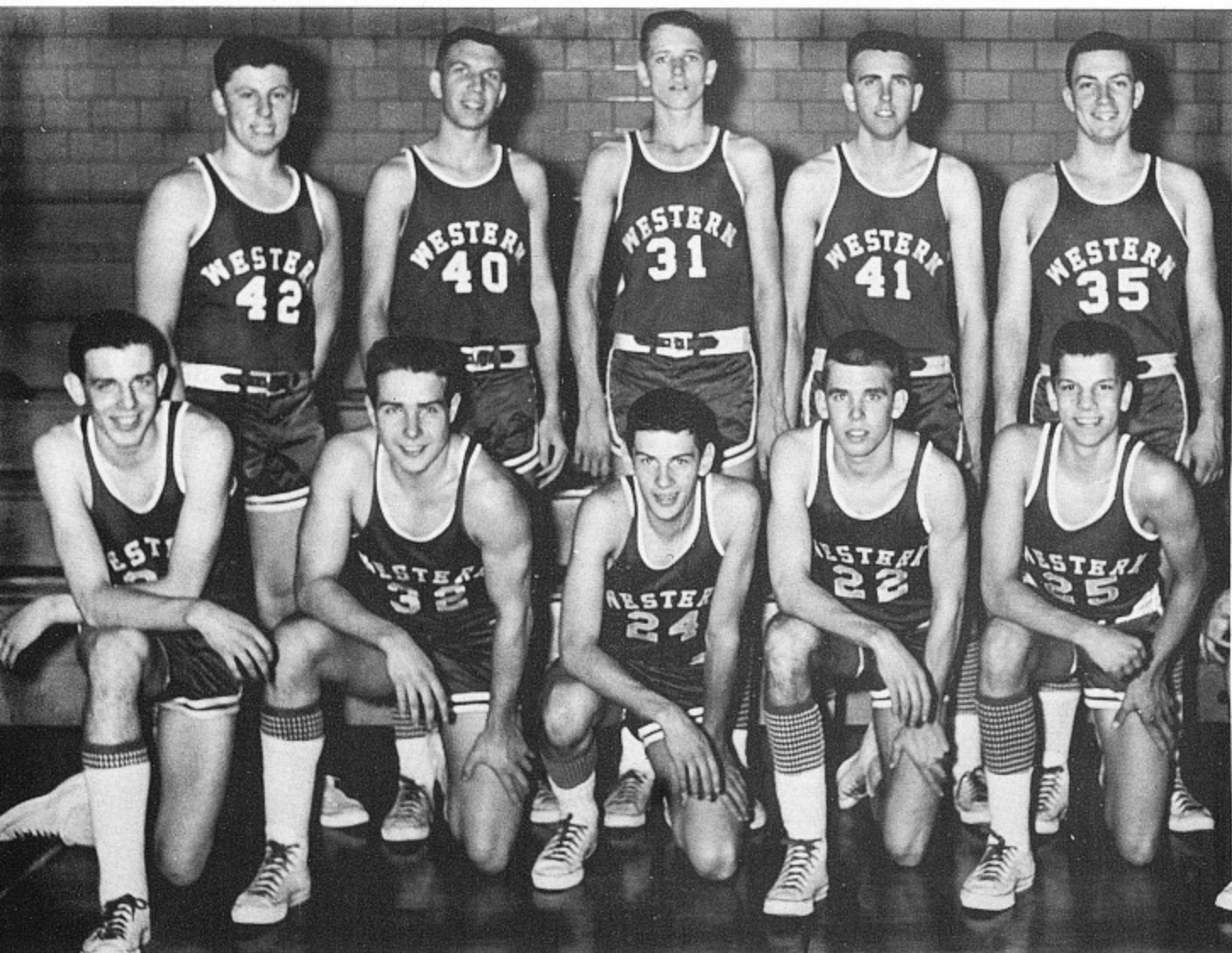

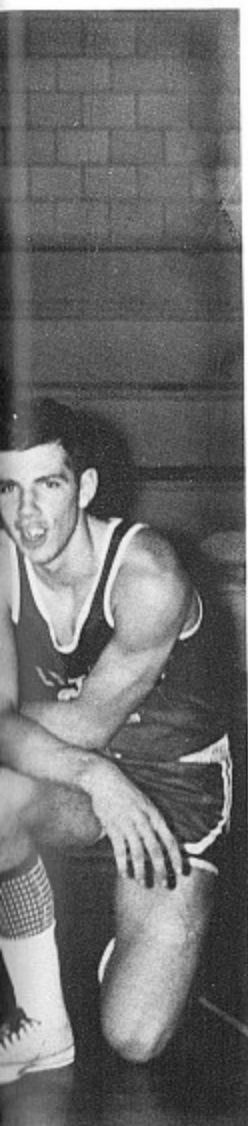

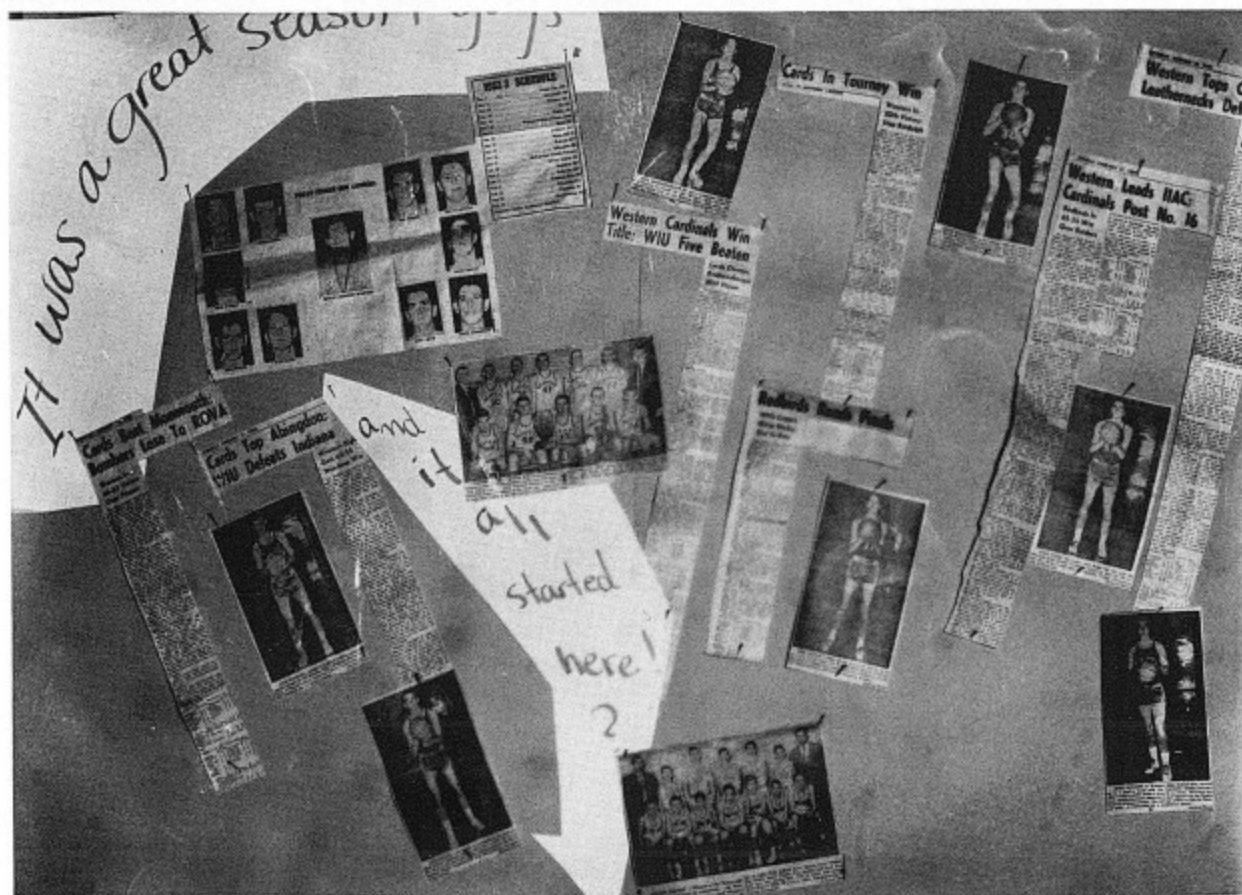


Most Valuable Players on Western's squad, Gail Knappenberger and Chuck Wanninger received all-state mention on the Associated Press basketball team.



Coach Howard Hohman poses with the seven trophies won by the Western High basketball teams.

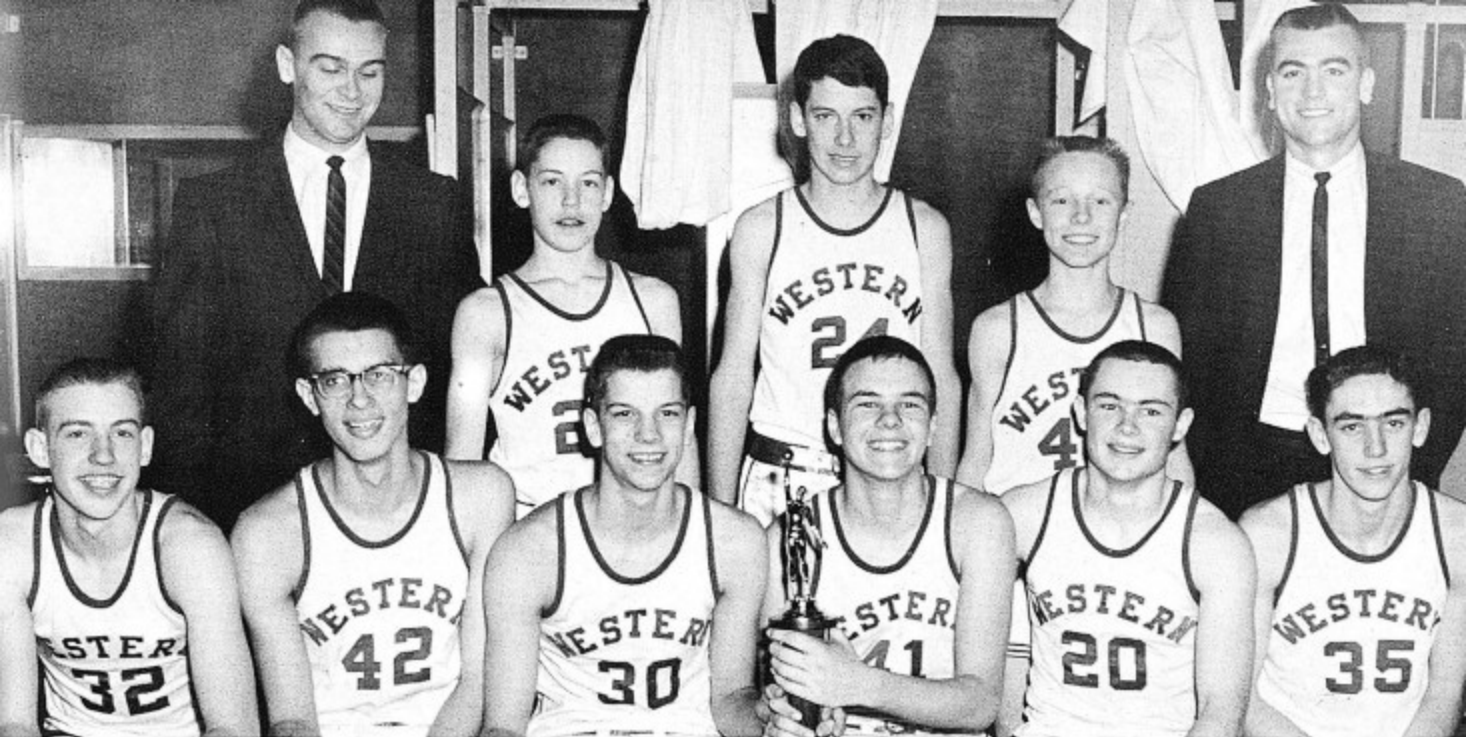




Bulletin board prepared by Betty Mercer and Audre Harris outlines season's highlights.

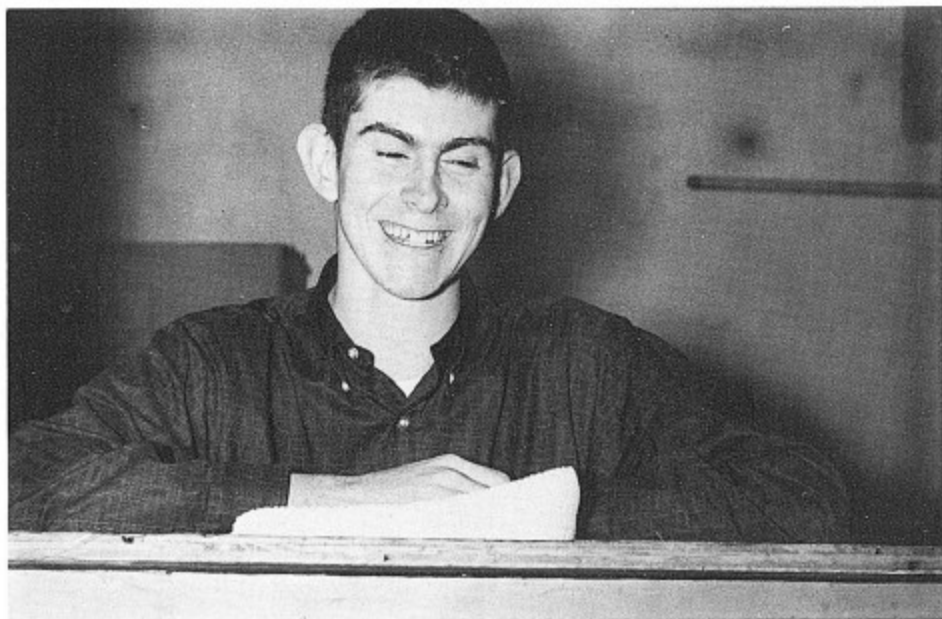

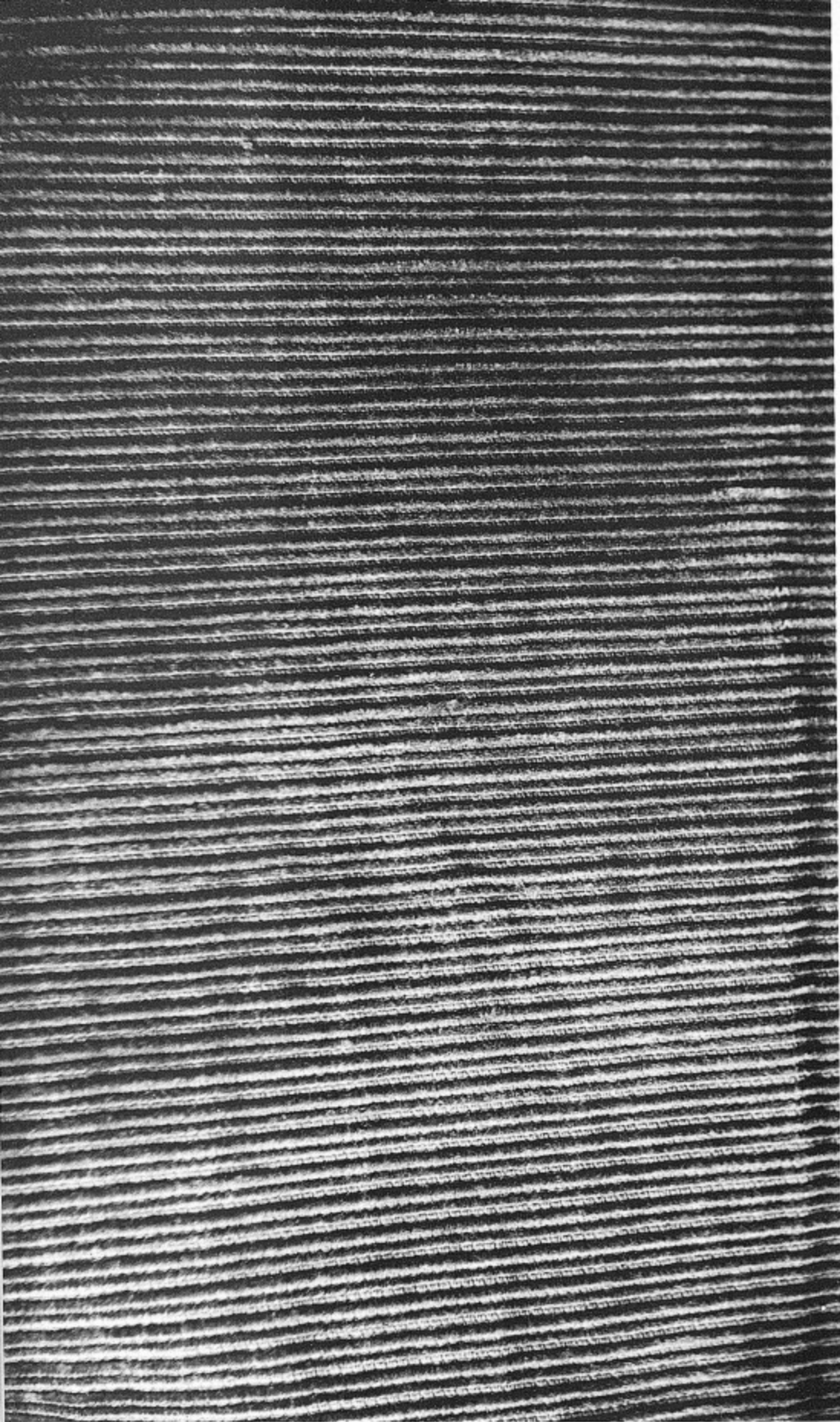
The heavyweight team compiled a season record of eleven wins and five losses. The highlight of the season was winning the District Tournament.

Western has accepted new and expanded responsibilities in the field of training teachers for our nation's schools. We are very proud of the fact that we are able to serve this worthy function.

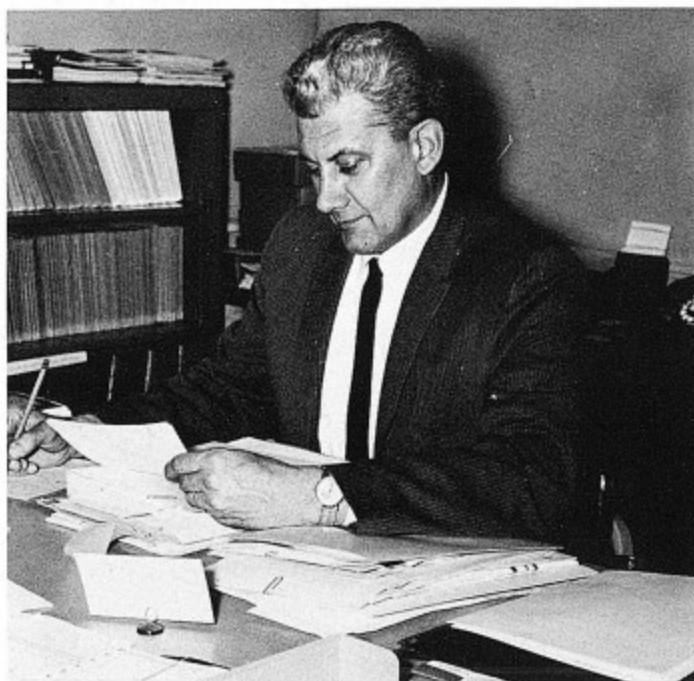
