Around the top of the building are the gargoyles which have watched over the Campus School for twenty-five years.

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Twenty-five years ago, on September 14, 1938, the first classes were held in the Laboratory Training School. There were 479 students in kindergarten through twelfth grade, 166 were in the Academy or high school. Dr. Kent Pease was the principal of the Academy and Miss Bessie Cooper and Miss Katherine Thompson were the grade school principals.

The new building was designed to harmonize with the other buildings on the campus. It was built of brick and stone with English-Georgian influence differing from the present building in that the gym had not been built.

Inside, the general room plan was much the same as today with only a few differences. The old gymnasium is the present music room and little gym. The music room was located in the third floor in what is now the homemaking room. Originally that room had been planned as a high school social room. The biology room was part of the chemistry-physics lecture room and laboratory. On the second floor across from the auditorium was a museum which contained Indian relics and shell and rock collections. Now it is used as a storage room for the theatre.

If the building has changed little, the traditions of Western have changed less. Then, just as today, the grade school children marched through the building in a Halloween parade; seniors still take a class trip (in 1939 they went to Chicago for three days); and there is still a spring band concert. There was a Penny Carnival twenty-five years ago, too; but it was sponsored by the Girl's League instead of the junior class. Both this year and twenty-five years ago there was an exchange assembly with Macomb High which featured the choruses and a trio upon both occasions.

The Student Council sponsored a Halloween dance, a Christmas dance, and noon hour recreation. They, like the 1963-1964 Council, encouraged good citizenship.

The Rostrum sponsored literary, musical, and speech contests. Its advisor was a chemistry teacher, Mr. Horrabin. Other organizations were G.A.A., debate, the Kommercial Klub, the Klicking Kamera Klub, and the Alambris Society, a chemistry club.

The Masquers presented The Three-Cornered Moon on February 15, 1939. The Palette and Brush Club helped construct the sets, and the band provided music.

At a music contest in Peoria on March 31, the band was rated second and the orchestra received a first. At Eastertime the Girl's League took an Easter basket to the children at the Macomb orphanage.

Western had a football team, a basketball team, which ranked second in the county league, and a baseball team. At a district track meet, the Academy ranked fourth out of forty-four schools.

A graduation reception was held on June 3, followed by Baccalaureate on June 4 and Commencement on June 5.

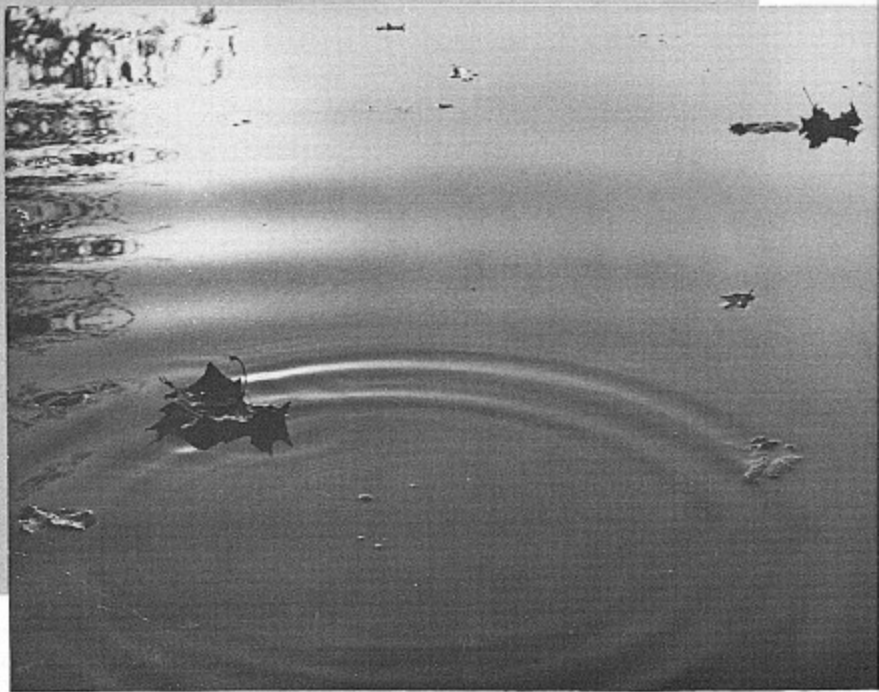
Some faculty members have taught at Western since the building was first opened. Miss Marjorie Burke and Mrs. Elna Scott Nail have both been here for twenty-five years. Miss Velna Sollars, now the Dean of Girls, did not teach at the Academy but she did work for the college as assistant registrar. Mr. H. Waldo Horrabin taught chemistry until this year when he gave up teaching to devote all of his time to his duties as principal.

On the division pages of this Epilogue we have used both old and new photographs to contrast 1939 and 1964. We hope that you will enjoy the comparison of the two years as we look forward to the next quarter century of growth and progress at Western.



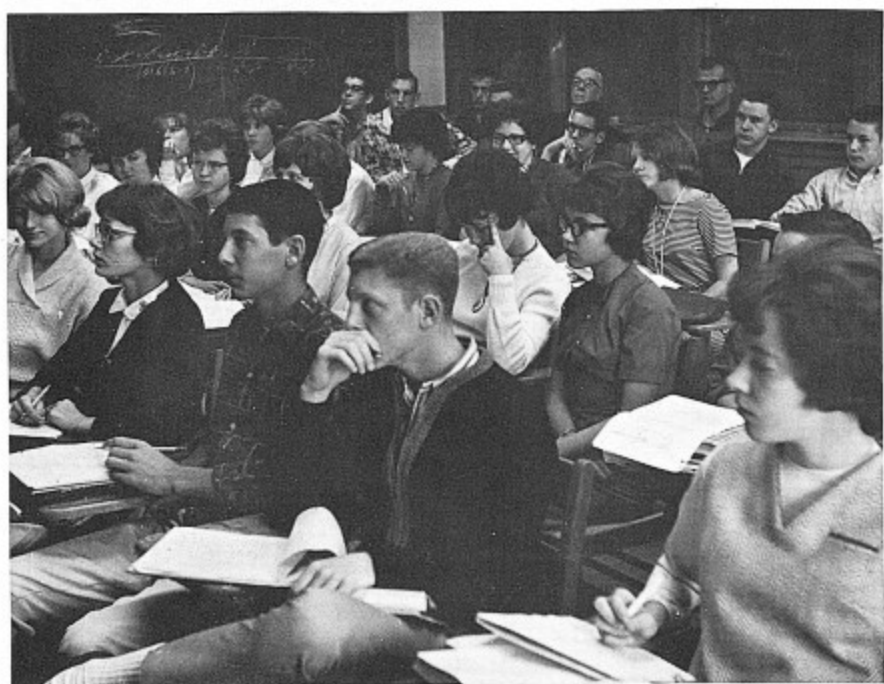

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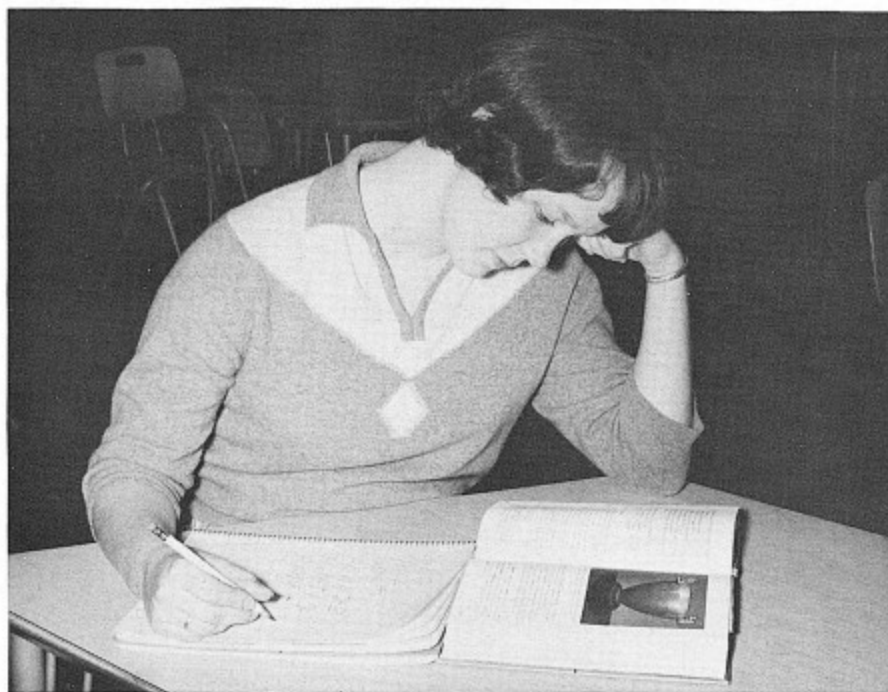
Visual aids helped the mathematics classes to understand geometric figures.



On field trips the biology class observed wildlife in its natural setting.

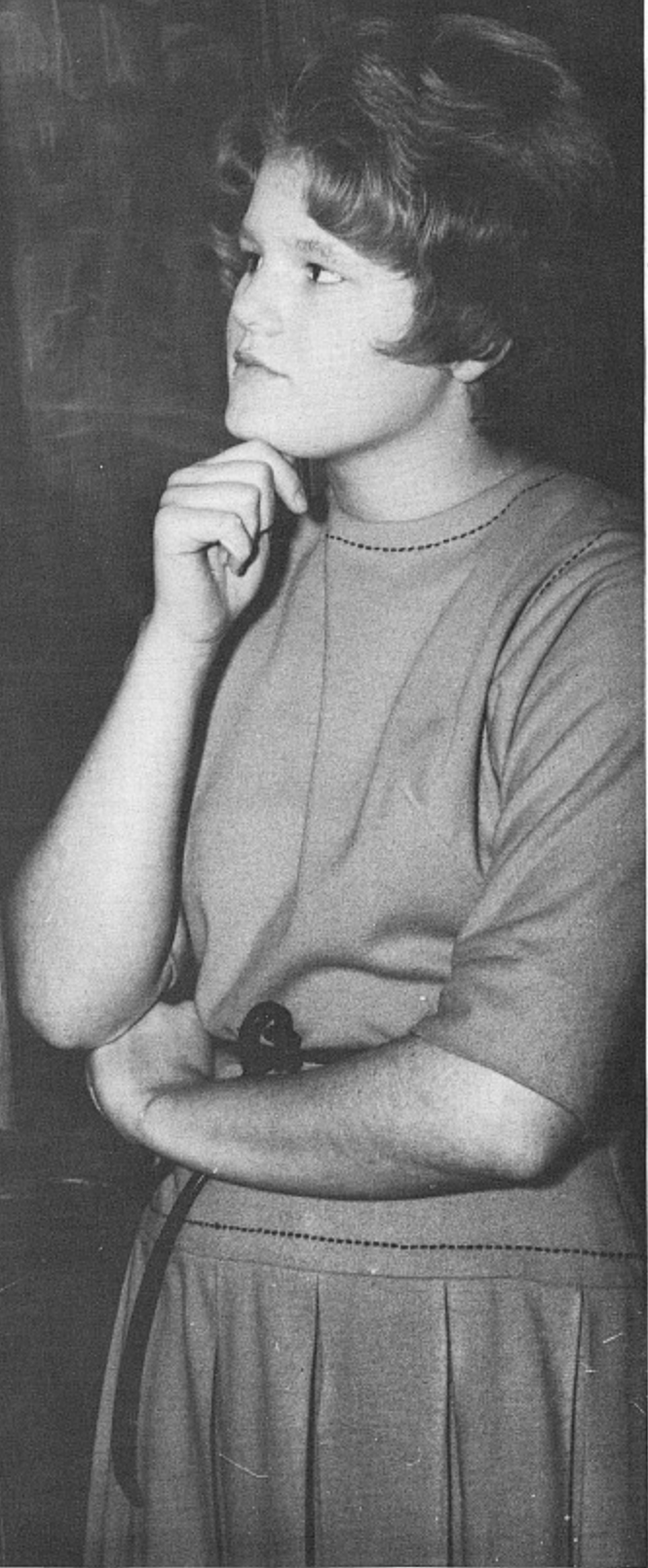

Honors at Western extended into many different areas. Western High students spent the year working on classwork and projects which brought distinction to the school.

Three seniors, Karen Olsen, Audre Harris, and Mike Glaza, received letters of recommendation as a result of their scores on the National Merit Scholarship test. The National Honor Society, composed of students who, after meeting scholastic and personal requirements, were elected by the faculty, spent the year organizing new ideas such as plans for an honor study hall. Members chose John Watson, president, Candy Strong, vice-president, Lois Griesenbrock, secretary, and Audre Harris, treasurer. Other members included Mike Glaza, Karen Olsen, Cathy Sypherd, David Viar, and Diana Wilson.

Elections played an important part in school activities. During the year six persons were elected as outstanding personalities of the school: Cheryl Bain, Candy Strong, Lynn Doolen, Mike Barsi, Jim Henderson, and Joe McLaughlin. Later, the Junior class chose Candy Strong and Tim Logsdon to reign over the Junior-Senior Prom.

Honors came to the school in the selection of good citizens. The faculty, after recommendation by the student government, chose Audre Harris and John Watson as outstanding citizens. Audre Harris and

David Viar accepted the D.A.R. award and S.A.R. award given annually on the basis of leadership, courage, service, and scholarship.

Lois Griesenbrock received the Betty Crocker award of Homemaker of Tomorrow. This award is based on a score earned on an achievement test. John Watson was chosen as the alternate to the appointee to the Air Force Academy. Chosen as runner-up to the Region 7 representative to Washington was Randy Perry, an Eagle Scout. He traveled to Springfield to present Governor Otto Kerner with an award in scouting and to report on the Boy Scout activities within the state.

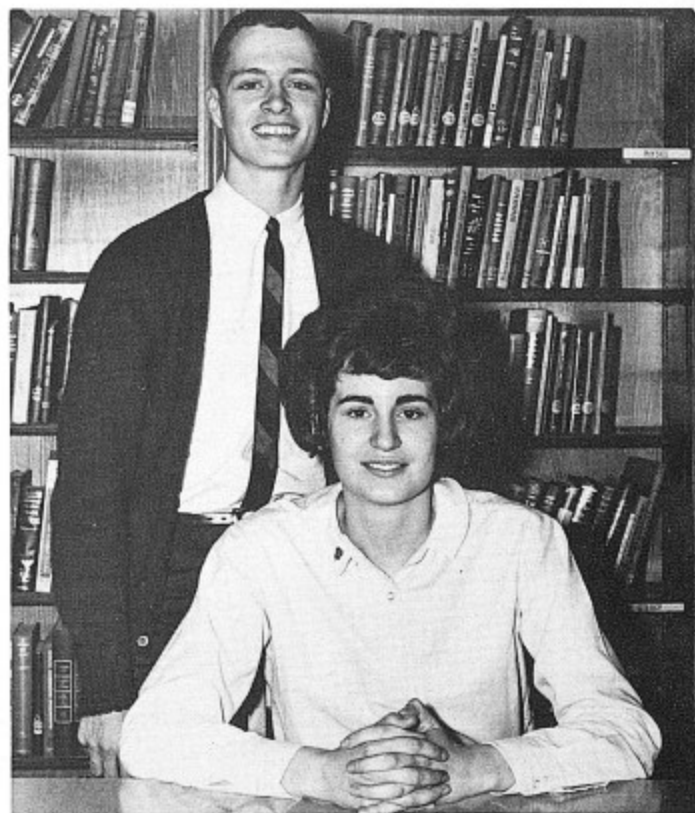

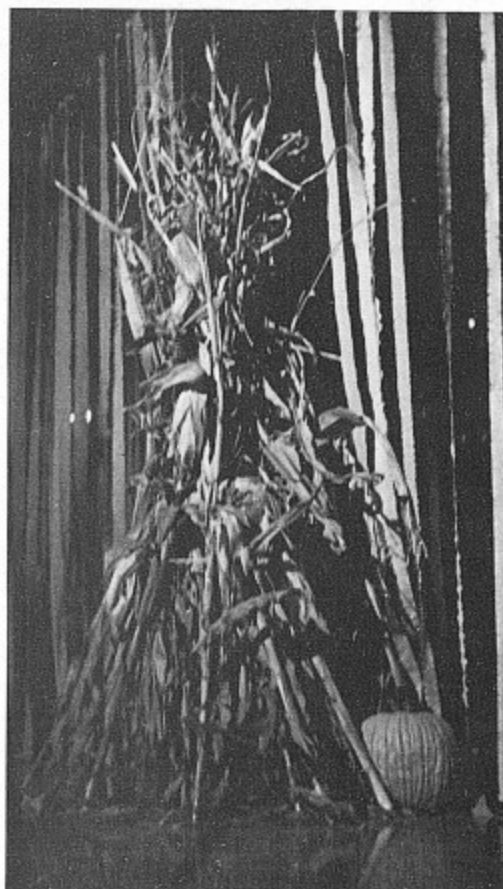

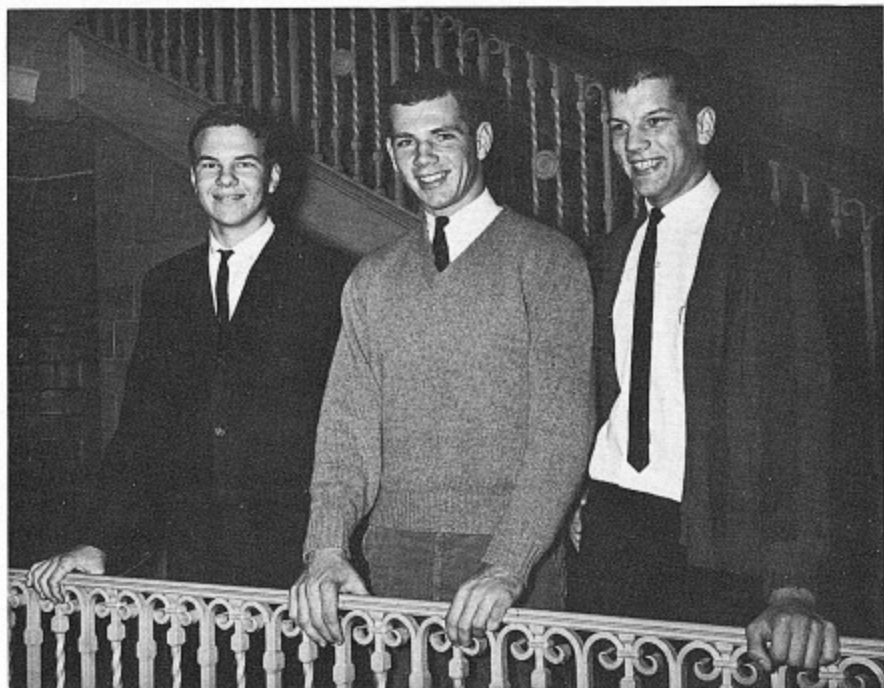

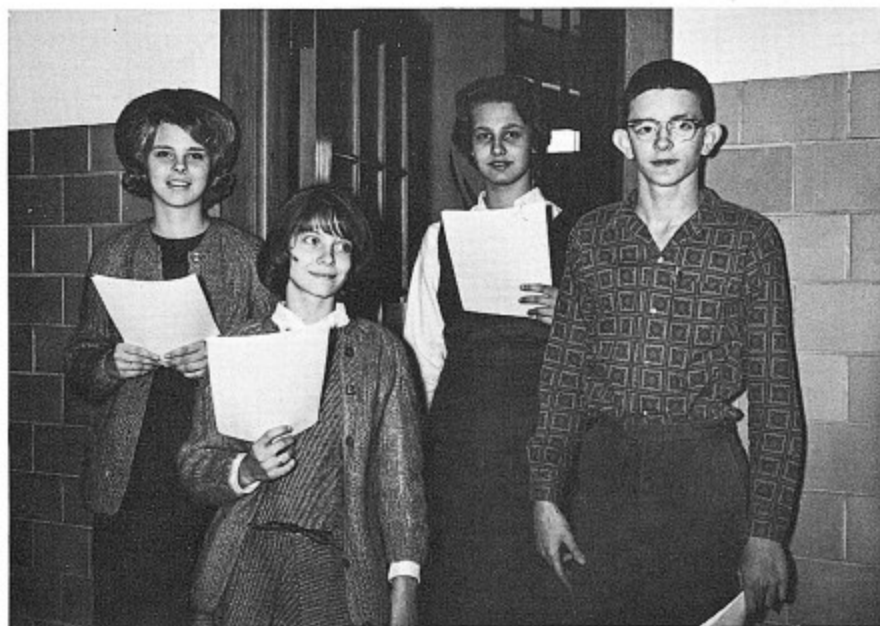

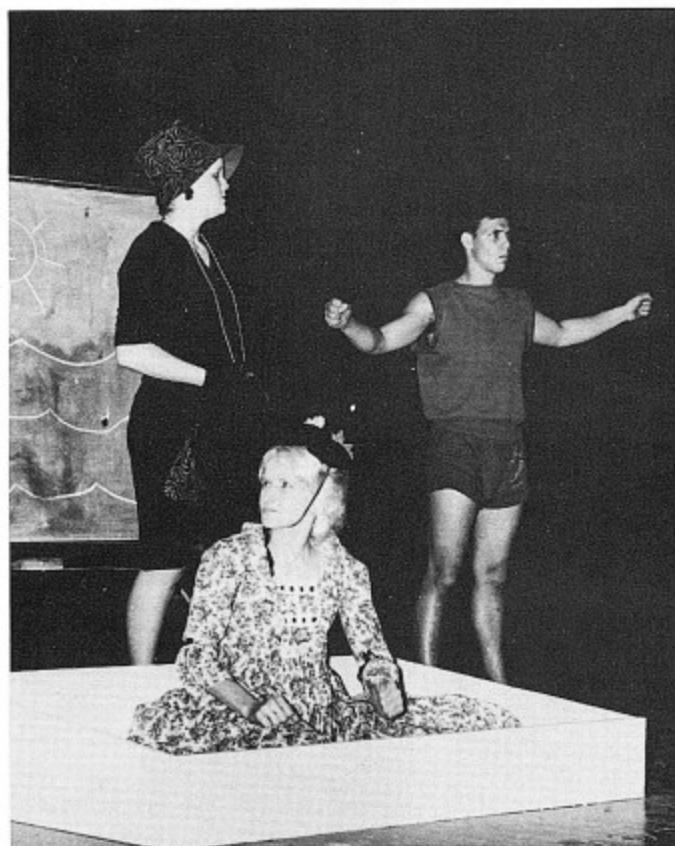

Mr. Claude Tarleton made these and all the other portraits in the book. David Goeke, a student at W.I.U., photographed and developed the candid and group pictures with the help of Mr. Don Crawford of the Audio-Visual Department at the University. When the picture-taking was underway, Copy Editor Lynn Doolen began assigning copy to members of her staff. Mrs. Connie McLaughlin and Mr. Charles Meline of the University Print Shop printed the copy. Dr. and Mrs. James L. Pate and Mr. Roy Sallée (emeritus in the Biological Sciences) contributed the old photographs and pictures which were used on the division pages.

As finished copy and pictures came in, editors began to work on their sections of the book. Editor Esther George planned the layout of the grade school pages. Classes Editor Muriel Knoblauch emphasized candid pictures of the students instead of copy. Sports Editor John Watson and assistant, Jeff Carson, selected the best action shots for the sports section. Or-

ganizations Editor Marcha Graham worked hard writing headlines for her pages. This year, Faculty Editor Sara Dobson, planned pictures of student teachers at work. At the same time, Music Editor Cathy Sypherd, was working to see if the large group pictures of the musical organizations could be a uniform size. Business Manager David Viar's big job came at the beginning of the year when he collected money for purchases of the *Epilogues*. While others of the staff were working on their parts of the book, Micki Head spent her time indexing the pages.

At last, the final pages had been sent to the company to be printed. Periodically, Mr. E.A. Anderson, the representative of the Intercollegiate Press, Inc. visited the staff to check on their progress.

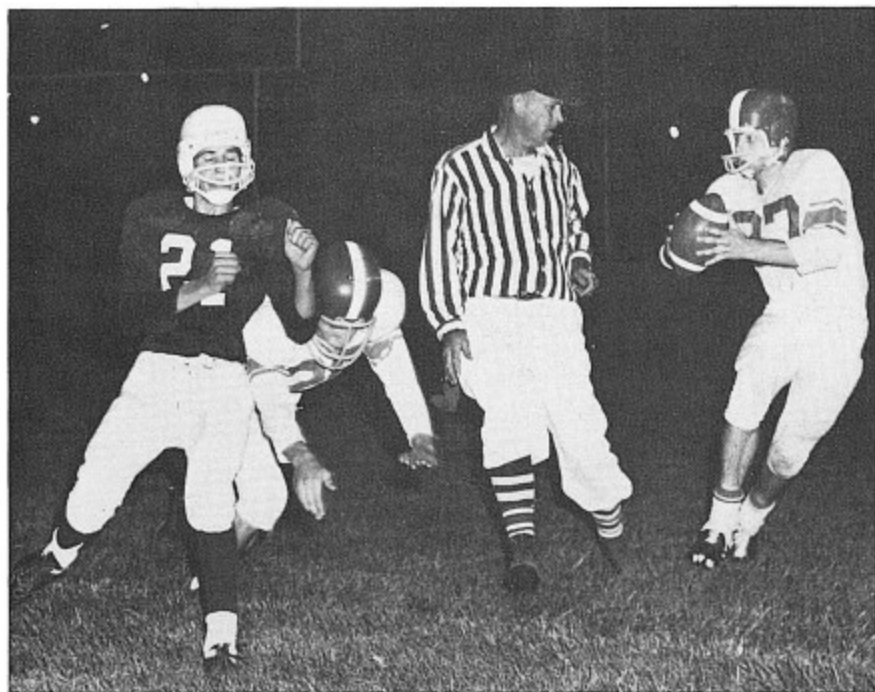

Unbeaten in both Lamoine Valley Conference and McDonough County competition, the Western High Cardinals won 22 out of 28 games. Coach Hohman scheduled the finest competition in the history of the school for the 1963-1964 season, and the rangy Western quintet held one of the finest records in Western Illinois.

The season began with an overtime victory over a strong Abingdon team, and the Cards were on the roll. The Redbirds then beat highly rated Conference foes in Dallas City and Warsaw. After suffering their first loss of the year to Canton, Western High, for the third straight year, won its Invitational Tournament, highlighted by a smashing victory over Peoria Spaulding.

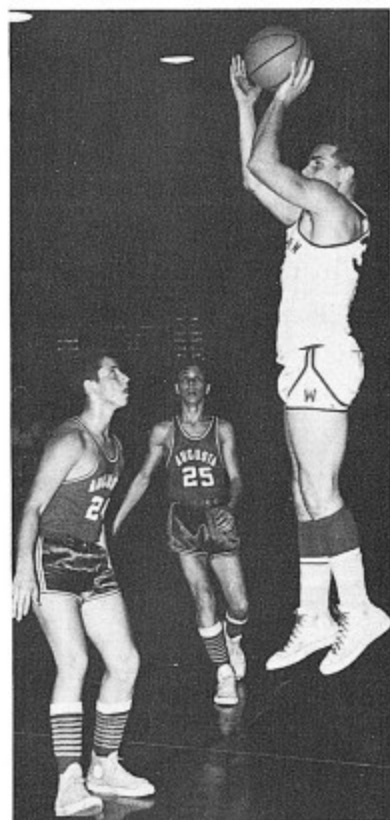
With one trophy under their belt, the team emerged as last second victors over Jacksonville, and beat Monmouth, before suffering their second setback of the year to Christian Brothers.

The Cards then beat Bushnell-Prairie City for the second time and a stubborn Northwestern crew for the Championship of the County Tournament.

County and Invitational champions, the Redbirds, then set their sights on the Conference title. After victories at Hamilton and Carthage, the "Big Red" set a scoring record of 106 points against Plymouth. Mike Glaza set an individual scoring record against Colchester by pouring 43 points through the net.

The Cardinals suffered losses to Peoria Central, University High of Normal and Monmouth while preparing for tournament competition. The Cardinals journeyed to Stronghurst to win the district championship for the third straight year. The final game of the tournament, as was getting to be a habit that year, was a victory over a tough Northwestern squad.

Western High won their first game of the Regional Tournament from Abingdon, but the end of a great season came at the hands of an eventual state finalist, Galesburg.

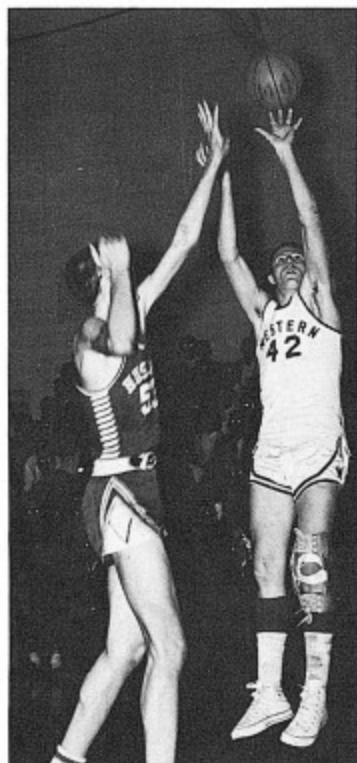

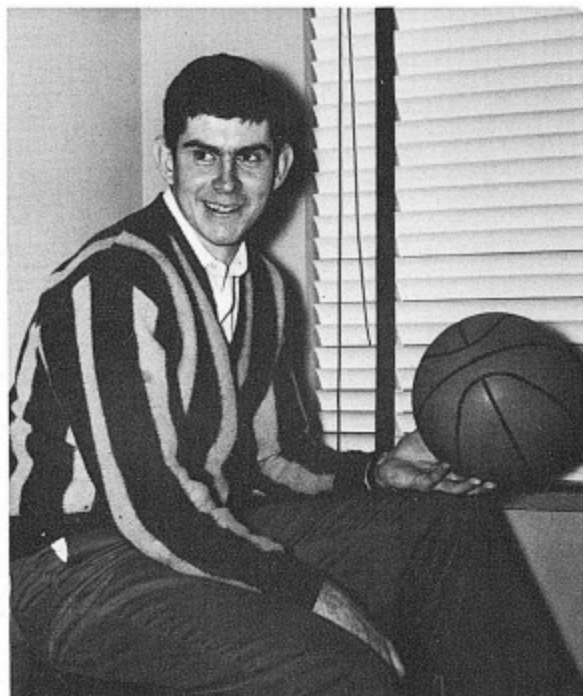

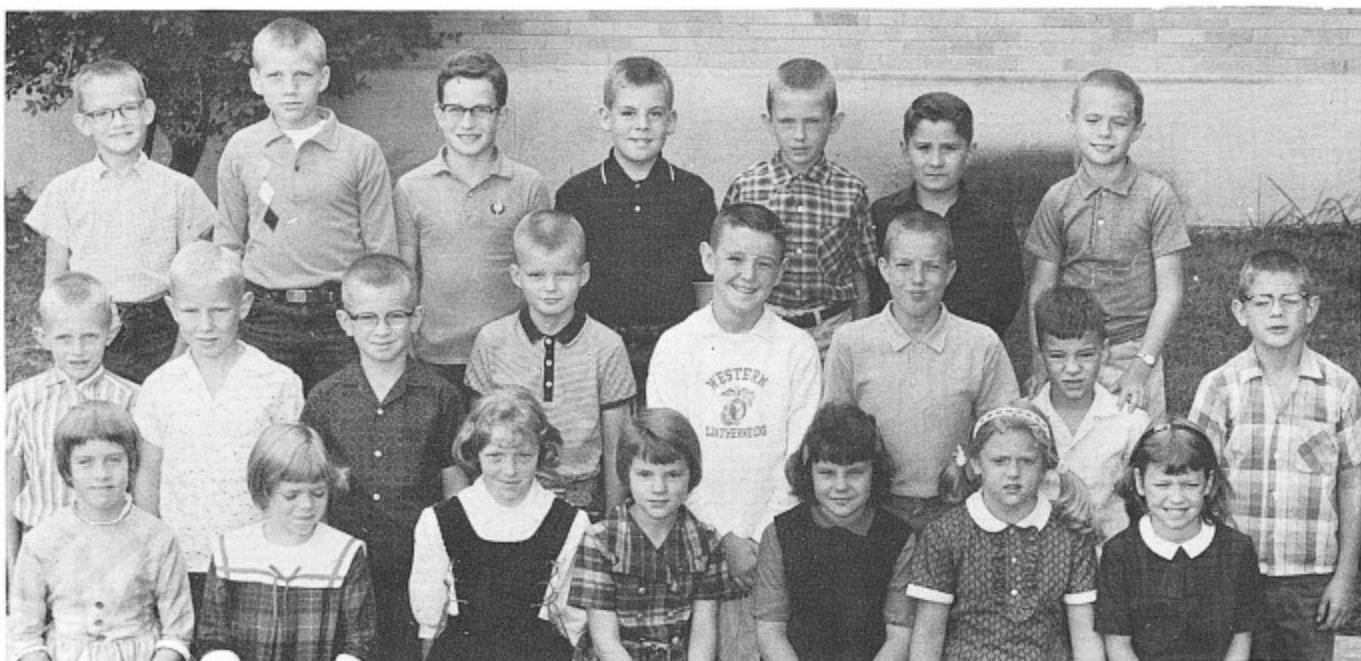

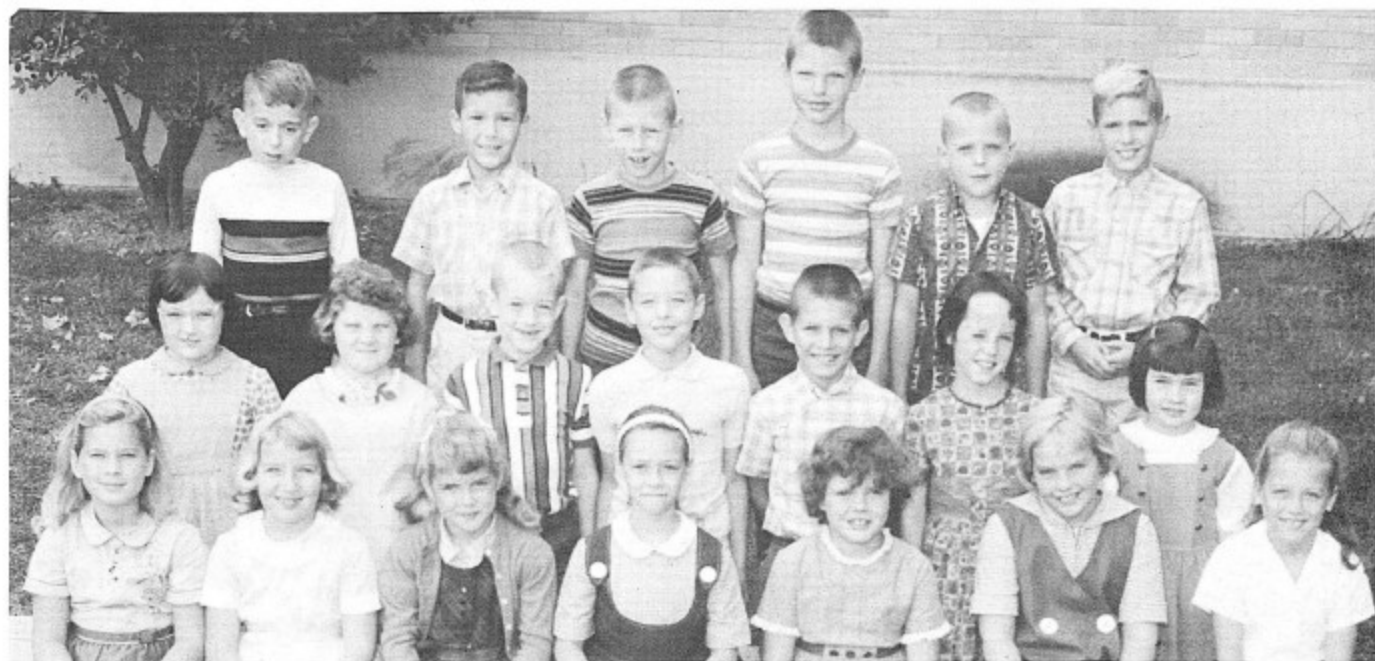

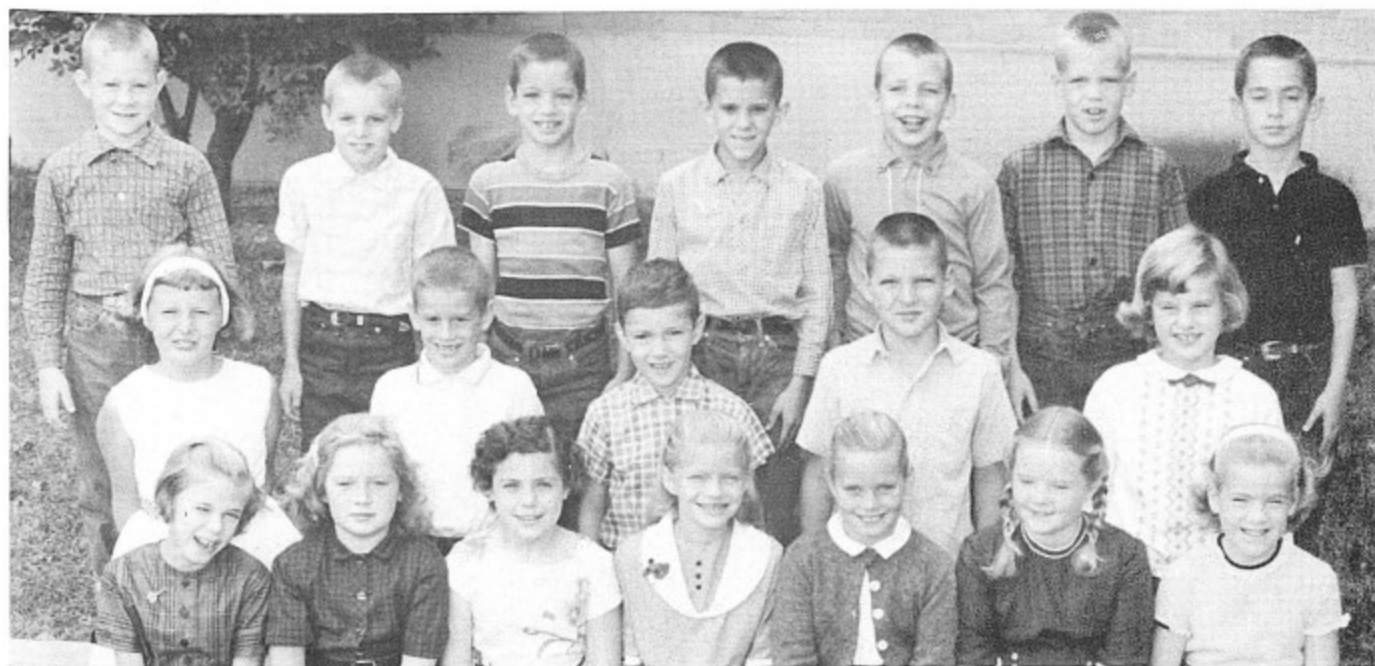

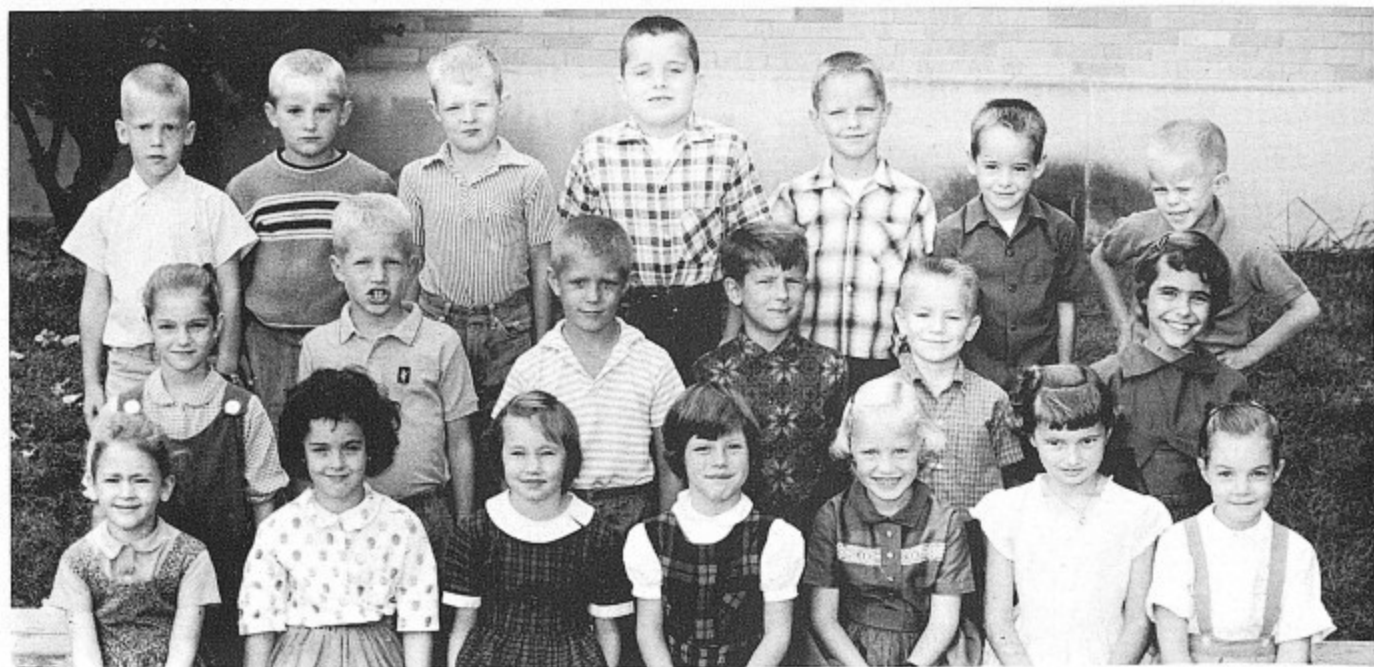

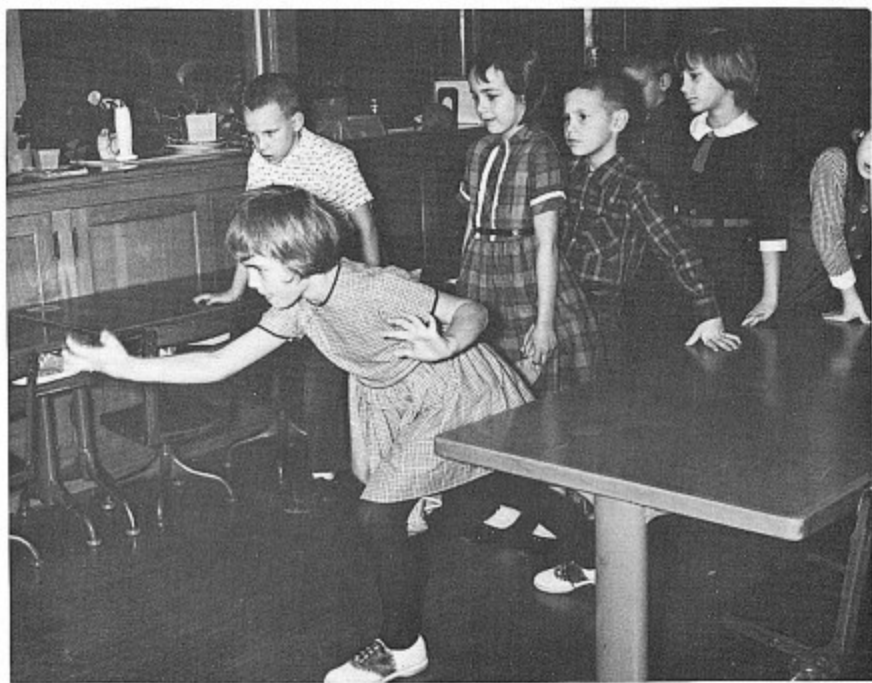

The past year has been one of change at Western High. New programs in science and mathematics including Physical Science Study Committee Physics and Biological Sciences Curriculum Study Biology were introduced. The latter was offered to one biology class for comparison with the course currently in use. A new geometry text was introduced as well as experimental teaching methods. Under the instruction of two teachers, Mr. Harding and Mr. Taylor, all geometry students were together as a group for a basic lecture at least once a week. At other times the class was divided into two sections.

Nine teachers joined the Western High faculty. They were Miss Betty Bloomfield, fourth grade; Miss

Carolyn Colvin, elementary physical education; Mrs. Madolyn Redman, kindergarten assistant; Mrs. Tena Reed, guidance assistant; Miss Lois Thompson, home economics; Mr. John Bohrer, music; Mr. Robert Dornquast, English, dramatics and speech; Mr. Donald Hamilton, physical science; and Mr. Willis Valett, driver's training, a new position at Western High, and boys' physical education.

In the past year an extensive program has been devoted to the Education 201 and 301 students. Laboratory students served as case studies for the 201 observations, while the 301's observed a class and then participated for a week. The student teaching program of the previous year was also continued.

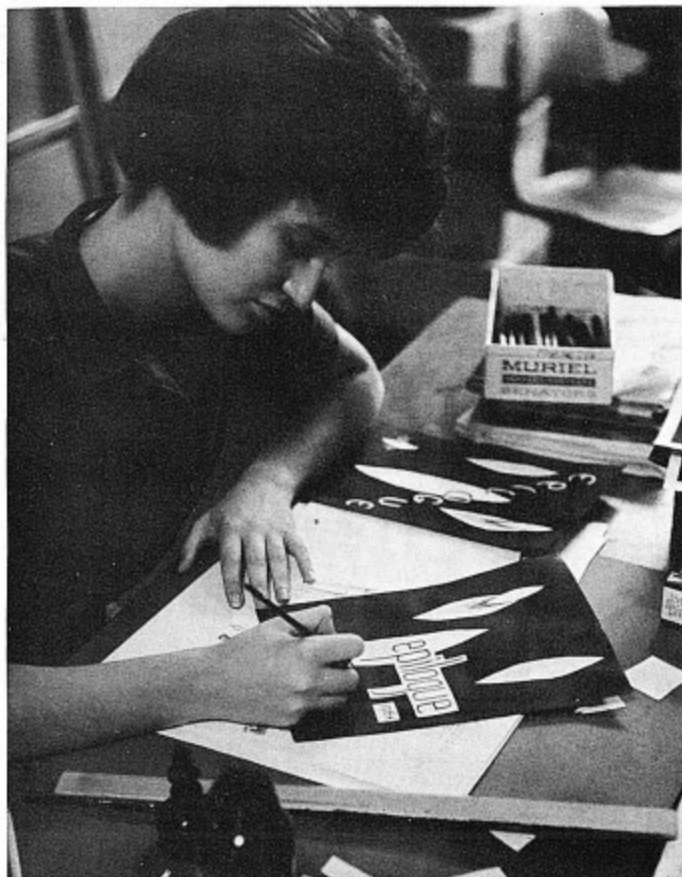

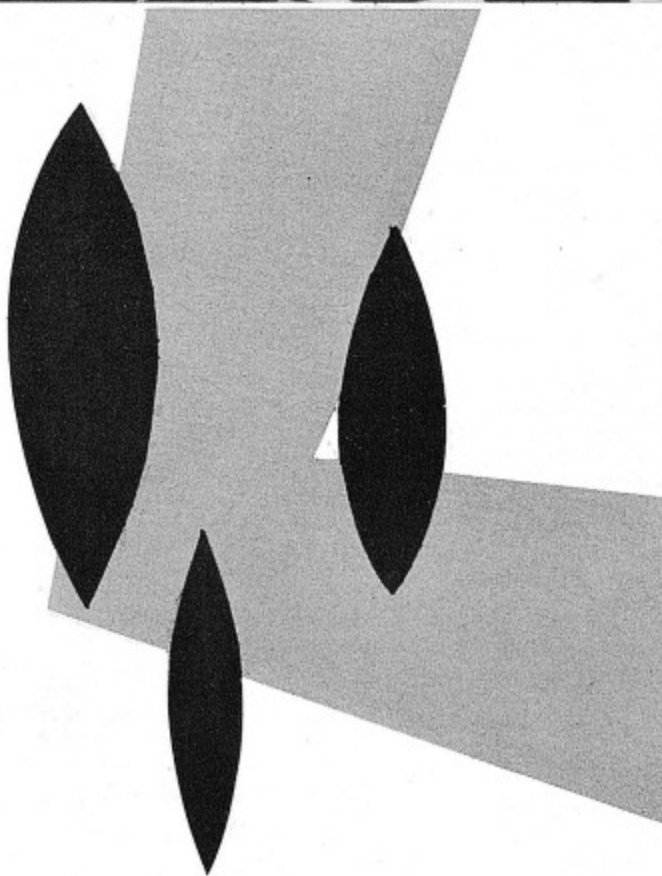
