



At a school dance Bill Galloway demonstrated a dance called the swim. Other dances popular during the year were the jerk and the frug.







The freshmen launched successful money-making projects, the most money coming from dances and concessions.






















PEP CLUB'S "RUFUS" LIFTED SCHOOL SPIRIT











In their 1964 season the Western football Cardinals enjoying one of the biggest turnouts in several years continued their winning ways. Their 5-3 season record earned them the 12th Lamoine Valley Conference championship in the last 13 years. The performance of new and young talent from the ranks of lower classmen provided an excellent supplement to the veteran players.

In the first contest of the year Bushnell handed the Cards their first loss of the season. The Western offense never really opened up as the defensive unit was on the field for two-thirds of the game. the Knoxville game, the first time Western got its hands on the ball, Quarterback Aldon Daniels moved the team to a touchdown. From there the defense held fast. This 12-0 win boosted the spirits of the Cardinals. At LaHarpe Western faced their first LVC conference opponent. The game turned out to be a scoring battle, but the final score, 26-12, tipped the scales in favor of the Cardinals. The Warsaw game was the easiest victory of the campaign. After a gigantic half-time lead, Western started the second half with many reserves. The Western defense held Warsaw to no scores while the offense rolled up fifty points for Western's second conference victory.

The homecoming game with Carthage was, as Coach Harry Sockler put it, "the determining game for the conference championship." Now, with that championship in sight, the team was more determined than ever. At the half, Western held a slim 7-6 lead. During the third period both teams earned another touchdown. Western failed on its next series of downs and was forced to give the ball to the Blueboys. Here, the Cardinal defense entrenched to fight off the advancing

Carthage offense. It was then that linebacker Bill Galloway pulled the surprise play of the season. He intercepted a lateral from the Carthage quarterback and ran for a touchdown. That iced the game for the Cards who won 20-12 and took over the conference lead.

Just added to the schedule, Aledo had an unimpressive record but was perhaps the toughest team of the year. The Aledo offense gained a two-touchdown lead in the first half and added another in the third period. Then, the Cards' offense began. The score was tied by Western with only one minute left to play. Aledo succeeded in completing a long touchdown pass that minute making the score 27-20. In Western's last futile try, the Cardinal offense was stopped on the Aledo 15-yard marker.

At Hamilton the conference crown would be decided. With a win or tie the Cards would have the championship to themselves. If they lost, they would share it with Carthage. In the first half the two offenses each scored once. Then in the second half Western ran away with the game scoring three touchdowns. Only in the final minutes when the game was all but won did the Cardinal defense permit a second Hamilton score. In their 27-13 win the cards took the coveted LVC crown. In the last game of the season Western faced Lewistown. After three periods of scoreless play Lewistown scored a touchdown. That was all they needed, for the equal teams battled scoreless for the last period.



CARDS CAPTURED TWELFTH LVC CROWN













The Cardinals during the course of the year earned the right to Co-Championship of the Lamoine Valley Conference and finished the season with an over-all record of 19-9.




6'5" Senior Tom Graff controlled the opening tip against Warsaw.




Graff and Barsi moved in to rebound position against Rushville.




