



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
#### Discovered: A New Western

Now, only one thing remains to be discovered this year: the 1968-69 Epilogue. Read on!




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



























# Experimental Lab School in Dr. Bernhard's Plans

We were absolutely terrified at the prospect of interviewing the paramount head of our institution. When we arrived at the central administration office, our terror was heightened by the immensity and apparent efficiency of the office. At first, we were able to sit and play "cool" until the secretary said, "Dr. Bernhard will see you now, girls." Somehow, we managed to make it across the floor to the entrance of his office. Immediately, our nerves were soothed by a warm handshake and one of the most gracious people we've ever had the good fortune to meet.

Dr. Bernhard at once began explaining what we

needed to know--his plans for the university and the part Western High will play in those plans. For years we, as students, have been aware of the need to justify our existence as an institution. Dr. Bernhard's solution is that we become in fact something that we have formerly only been in name—a laboratory school. The emphasis will be on the new and different which will mean that both faculty and students will have to be able to adjust to a non-routine schedule. The advent of new techniques for both the teaching and learning processes will offer Western an excitement that for the first time makes us wish we had been born a few years later.








### Seniors Head List of Honor Students


its debut after a lull of 6 months.





### Tri-Mu







The spirit fire burned brightly at the Homecoming game that night. The flame dimmed as the Cardinals were defeated by Knoxville, I3 to 6.








Western's twirlers add spark to Homecoming half-time.




## Western High Cardinals Surge Ahead







#### Cardinals Fire Up!











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
