

















Fundamental blocking drills during practice were instrumental in providing the skill needed for the Western offensive line for keeping out the opponent's defense during games.





CARDS WIN 8 STRAIGHT VICTORIES

The Western High Cardinals closed their 1969 football season with a fine record of 8 wins and only one loss. It was a great season for the Cards, considering that last year the team was barely able to pull out a winning season of 5 wins and 4 losses. Some of the highlights of the season included a 46-0 homecoming romp over Abingdon and a 22-0 victory over Knoxville, who last year beat the Cards in the homecoming game. The Cards' only set-back was a 14-8 decision in favor of Carthage. This game ended Western's winning streak at eleven.


The season was great for individual team members also. Dean Watson, the most valuable player, led the rushing with 881 yards out of 182 attempts, making a 4.3 average. Brian Abel, the most-improved player, completed 34 passes out of 64 attempts for a total of 533 yards and 7 touchdowns. The top receiver was Jack Frost with 14 receptions, and the leading tackler was Lee Johnson with 73 tackles. But as Coach Hepinstall has stated many times "Individuals do not make a team," and that was proved this year.

Coaches were Mr. Hepinstall, Mr. Karas, Mr. McLaughlin, Mr. Lunt, and Mr. Sorensen.





Win Ten Straight at Home










Enthusiasm is a virtue at Western.



Assembly Kicks Off Homecoming




























Art Students Color Bleak Walls












Rick Perry puts his fingers to use as he cuts slides in the Audio-Visual Center.







"Effete corps of impudent snobs" challenged a President and ran head-on into the Vice-President. The Prince of Wales was invested at Caernarvon Castle while his mother lost another throne. (Her Majesty was reportedly not amused.) Political careers were killed and were born. A nation and a world seemed confused and distressed.

NOVEMBER: Second moratorium. Haynesworth rejected by Senate.

DECEMBER: Draft lottery held. Great Britain abolished capital punishment.

JANUARY: Biafra surrendered. Prime Minister Wilson visited U. S.

FEBRUARY: Guyana became a Republic. (God save the queen!) Southern schools desegregated.


MARCH: Five of the Chicago 7 convicted. Bank of America burned in Berkeley riots.
